Is Arrested.—Mr. Arnot of Cooston was arrested by Deputy Game Warden Si Noah this week for discharging firearms after dusk. He will have his hearing before Justice Penneck soon.

To Give Social.—The Marshfield Lodge of the Fraternal Union of America is planning to issue invitations soon for a dance and social to be given at the Odd Fellows hall Friday evening, December 15. It will be a strictly invitational affair.

New Club House.—Miss Violet Henderson, secretary of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, is in receipt of an invitation to attend the opening of the new club house of the Eugene Commercial Club, Friday evening, December 8.

Beach Homer.—The steam schooner Homer was beached at noon today near Empire to ascertain just what the damages to the vessel are. It is believed that only an inner shaft was broken. Until the examination is made it will be impossible to tell when she will sail for San Francisco.

Fix Paving.—The Coos Bay Paving and Construction company yesterday began relaying the hard surface paving on Hall avenue near the High school. The first time it was laid, not enough bitumen was put on and the property owners refused to pay for it. Now the bitumen is being taken up and a new coat of bitumen is being put in.

Mill to Close.—The C. A. Smith mill will close down for a couple of weeks sometime within the next few months for repairs and alterations. It was reported that the shut-down would be during the holidays but Supt. Geo. F. March stated today that the time would depend on the demand for lumber. He said it might not be until spring.

Meet Wednesday.—The Ladies' Aid society of the Marshfield Swedish Lutheran church will hold its annual meeting Wednesday afternoon, December 6, for the purpose of electing officers and transacting other business. The meeting will be at the Lutheran church hall. Mrs. Myren and Mrs. Sanquist will have charge of the refreshments. Plans for the ensuing year will be made.

Not on Boat.—Harry Hoy, who recently returned from Salem, met Jay Doyle, formerly of Marshfield, at Drain. He said that he expected to be in Marshfield this week. He was not on the steam schooner Washington, when she was almost wrecked near Astoria a few weeks ago, as was reported here at the time. The Doyle on the Washington was Joe Doyle.

Phases Chamberlain.—Senator Chamberlain in a letter to the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce acknowledges the receipt of a copy of the American Lumberman with the writ-up of the C. A. Smith properties says he hopes to visit Coos Bay next summer and says that the coming of the railroad will mean a wonderful growth in this section. He asks to be remembered to all his friends on the Bay.

Nothing to Say.—F. A. Warner, of the C. A. Smith company, said this afternoon that there was nothing to give out concerning the visit of Mr. Webster here with Mr. C. A. Smith and himself. It was reported reliably yesterday that Mr. Webster was a representative of the Northwestern Railway which is said to have its eyes on Coos Bay as a Pacific coast terminal. Mr. Warner said that Mr. Webster was here on private business and had to come in, look the country over and leave without being advertised.

To Raise Seeds.—The Marshfield Chamber of Commerce is in receipt of an inquiry from the Oregon Development League as to the possibility of interesting ranchers in Coos county in a proposition to raise seed peas. The latter states that the Everett B. Clark company of Milford, Conn., wishes to contract for the product of about three hundred acres of seed peas. Mr. Clark, head of the company, was given to understand that conditions here were excellent. In the east, farmers net from \$25 to \$40 per acre from seed peas and it is claimed that in Coos county the crop should be greater. The Chamber of Commerce will take the matter up with local ranchers.
