

## IRRIGATION IS TALKED OVER

Nineteenth Annual Congress Opens In Chicago Today With Many Present.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

CHICAGO, Ill., Dec. 5.—Experts in irrigation from many Western states and a dozen foreign countries including Mexico, Canada, Central and South America and government officials interested in the reclamation of arid and swamp lands, attended the opening today of the nineteenth annual meeting of the National Irrigation Congress. The work already done and the problems still to be overcome in the United States were presented before the congress in these figures:

Twelve million acres already irrigated.

Thirty-six million acres still to be irrigated.

Eighty million acres of swamp lands to be reclaimed.

Dr. F. H. Newell, director of the United States Reclamation Service; R. P. Teele, in charge of the Irrigation Statistics Bureau of the Census Department, and Senator Borah of Idaho were among the speakers today.

Taft's message to Congress was in part as follows: "I am very glad to take this means of assuring the friends of irrigation of some of the continued interests in the subject and my belief in the importance of going forward without a halt in the work of bringing under cultivation and making habitable by man the arid regions of the United States."

A telegram received by Myrtle Camp Woodmen of the World of this city, announces the death of Ben Hollenbeck, as taking place in the American hospital at the City of Mexico on Tuesday, November 28.

Mr. O. C. Sanford, Clerk of School District No. 8, has completed the enumeration of pupils in the district entitled to the apportionment of school funds, showing 252 males and 241 females, or a total of 493, a gain of fifteen over last year.

Ira E. Wheeler of North Bend who was for three years connected with the Coos Bay Condensing Co., was in the city Monday calling upon creamery people here in an endeavor to interest them in a condensing plant to be run in conjunction with the creamery. It is an interesting fact that between this city and Myrtle Point there are 2,000 cows, yielding on an average two gallons of milk per cow which would mean to this city, with this amount of first class raw material at hand, somewhere in the neighborhood of 300 cases of condensed milk per day, an average employment of twenty people and an approximate payroll of \$20,000 per month.

## A. M. SIMPSON IS LAUNCHED

New Steam Schooner of Simpson Lumber Company Christened Today.

THE LAUNCH OF THE SIMPSON.

(Written for The Times by Capt. T. J. Macgeen of the steamer Breakwater.)

We are gathered here from far and wide

To see this freighter touch the tide. And when she hits the ocean spray And proudly dances on the Bay, We'll give three cheers for Kruse Banks.

Two builders of the foremost ranks. Her frames are Orford Cedar, fine; Her planks are of the staunch Coos Pine;

She's staunchly built from stern to bow, With fine clean run and clipper prow, She's a Coos Bay liner through and through;

Long may she sail the ocean blue! With favored gales and flowing sheet; The Flagship of great Simpson's fleet!

"Simpson!" Her name we hail with praise. The Lumber King of early days; And foremost of our pioneers; The grand old man near ninety years. He came here fifty years ago.

When Coos Bay stocks and bonds were low And since that time the old town mill Was rarely ever standing still.

Then hurrah! for honest Banks and Kruse; Long may they lay staunch keels in Coos! And hurrah! for the grand old Lumber King; His praise I'll never cease to sing!

For high intellect, genius, force and lofty thought, The name of Simpson ne'er will be forgot.

The following additional verse was read by Miss Isabelle Macgeen, daughter of Capt. Macgeen just as the vessel was being launched:

Knock down your blocks and let her go! The flood tide soon will cease to flow, Then I'll baptize thee with champagne, And with one voice we will proclaim:

"Simpson" is thy name; ride proudly at sea— Neptune, God of the Brine, watch over thee.

The "A. M. Simpson," flagship of the Simpson fleet and the best vessel of the many built by the Simpson Lumber company, was launched at the Kruse & Banks shipyards at North Bend at noon today.

The vessel gracefully glided off the ways into the waters of Coos Bay at 12:25, a few minutes earlier than was scheduled and was christened the "A. M. Simpson" in honor of the head and founder of the Simpson Lumber company by Miss Isabelle Macgeen, daughter of Capt. and Mrs. T. J. Macgeen of Empire.

A large audience witnessed the launching, including many Marshfield people. The launching was not marred by the slightest accident. Kruse & Banks, the builders of the new vessel, have had the best season this year of any of the Pacific Coast shipyards. Besides this vessel, they built the Patsy and Tillamook for Columbia river parties, the launch Owl for San Francisco parties, a big snag scow for the government, three big scows for the C. A. Smith Lumber company and have a sea-going launch under construction for Peter Olson.

Well Built Vessel. The new boat has fine lines and is one of the staunchest crafts that Kruse & Banks have put up. No pains or expense have been spared that would add to her seaworthiness. Nearly 800,000 feet of lumber entered into her construction; 50 tons of bolts with 300 kegs of spikes and 11,000 trenails have been used to fasten her together. This gives but an inkling of the stability she represents. Her main deck was made of 7x5 inch planks and 27 inches of timber support the deck beams near the frames, which are but 6 inches apart. By building in this manner, the usual waterways were substituted by the timbers beneath the deck and thus more room is allowed for the storage of lumber cargo.

The exact dimensions of the boat are 200 feet keel, 41 feet beam and 13½ feet depth of hold.

## REV. ESTBJURG PASSES AWAY

Former Marshfield Lutheran Pastor Dies Suddenly In New Haven, Conn.

Word has just been received by the Rev. B. F. Bengtson of the death of Rev. Dr. C. M. Estbjurg, former pastor of the Marshfield Swedish Lutheran church, which occurred at New Haven, Conn., November 25.

No particulars were given but it is presumed that death was due to heart failure as he had suffered from heart trouble while a resident of Coos Bay.

News of Mr. Estbjurg's death will be received with intense regret by the many friends he made during his pastorate here. He served here from 1894 to 1900. He was an excellent scholar and a year or so ago received high decorations from the king of Sweden for his ability and work.

Rev. Estbjurg was born in Princeton, Ill., in 1852, his father being the founder of the Augustana Synod of America. In 1863 the family returned to Sweden and again came to America in 1873. While in Sweden, Mr. Estbjurg studied at the University of Uppsala, the foremost educational institution of Sweden. On his return to America, he entered Augustana College at Rock Island, Ill., and graduated there. Later he served on the faculty of Augustana college for three years. Later he served as pastor at San Francisco, then came to Coos Bay and from here to Kingsburg and later to New Haven, Conn.
