Elks Meeting.—At a meeting of the Marshfield lodge of Elks last evening, Harry Winkler of North Bend, was initiated and fitted with the apron. There was a good turnout and the meeting made one of the most enjoyable sessions the lodge has held in a long time.

Demand For Boxes.—There has been a big demand for boxes in the Marshfield postoffice recently and now all of the boxes except two are rented. When free delivery is inaugurated here February 1, it is expected that there will be a big slump in the box rentals.

Meet Friday.—The young people's society of the Marshfield Swedish Lutheran will meet Friday evening at the church hall at 8 o'clock. It will be the annual business meeting and officers will be elected for the ensuing year, a social time will follow and all members are urged to attend.

Price Too High.—Owing to the high bids on three spraying machines desired to aid in cleaning up the fruit tree pests in this section, the county court at Coquille this week rejected all of them. Inspector P. M. Hall-Lewis was instructed to take the matter up and try to get more reasonable terms. It is expected the machine will cost about \$400 each.

Savings Increase.—The deposits in the Postal Savings Department of the Marshfield postoffice have reached the total of \$9,087, which is more than has been deposited in the postal banks of some of the large cities. The department was started here less than six months ago and Deputy Postmaster Sumner is hopeful that it will reach the \$10,000 mark by the end of the first six months.

Got Off Cheap.—Mayor Straw was the first of the candidates in the Marshfield city election to file his campaign expense account with the city recorder as required by law. The expense account is in affidavit form which Mayor Straw, before Arthur McKeown as notary public, swears that he did not contribute a cent to a campaign fund. Mr. Straw's campaign committee has not yet filed its expense account.

BOB SMITH CHOSEN.

"Bob" Smith, opposing two other candidates named Smith, was elected mayor of Grants Pass by a plurality of just three votes.

In addition to electing city officials, Oakland voted to give an independent telephone company a franchise. Sutherland voted \$30,000 bonds for a water system and re-elected city councilmen, whose terms had expired.

Pendleton voted down the commission form of government and elected for mayor W. F. Matlock, former mayor, by 80 votes over Ray Raley. The election was the hottest ever waged in that city, and over \$40,000 changed hands on the result. Grant B. Dimick was elected mayor of Oregon City by 112 majority over William Andersen. Salem elected a "wet" council and endorsed the non-partisan primary for the nomination of city candidates.
