State Dairy Commissioner Says Eight, Sixteen and Twenty-Four Ounces.

Gentlemen:—In reply to your favor of the 11, will say that according to a law that was enacted last winter it is legal for you to cut your butter in 24 ounce squares. Enclosed please find copy of law.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation to sell, offer or expose for sale any sort weight butter within the State of Oregon. All butter sold, or exposed or offered for sale in rolls, prints or squares within the State of Oregon shall be plainly marked, "Eight Ounces, Full Weight," "Sixteen Ounces, Full Weight," "Twenty-four Ounces, Full Weight," and every roll, print or square sold, or offered or exposed for sale any short weight butter with-ounces marked thereon; and any person, firm, association or corporation violating any of the provisions of this Act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$100, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not less than thirty days nor more than six months, or both such fine and imprisonment.

BURIED CHURCH IS EXPLORED

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)
JERUSALEM, Palestine, Dec. 6.—A discovery which promises to be of great interest to the Christian world has been made on the top of the Mount of Olives.
Under the auspices of the Greek Catholic order of monks called the "White Fathers," excavations were begun recently in the grounds of the institution known as the Carmelite convent of the "Pater Noster." The convent and the beautiful little chapel attached were built about thirty-six years ago by and at the expense of the late Aurella de Bossi, Princess de la Tour d'Auvergne, Duchesse de Bouillon, and is now occupied by French nuns of the Carmelite order.
During her lifetime the late Princess turned over the convent and its grounds to the French government. The institution is consequently considered as French property now. France, in turn, placed it under the guardianship of the "White Fathers," allowing them a free hand in its management both spiritual and temporal and in the carrying on of exploratory researches or excavations whenever the occasion arose or an opportunity offered.
The "White Fathers" have long held to the belief that the grounds must cover the site of some buried ancient church or edifice in accordance with long-preserved records in their possession, and acting on this belief, excavations were commenced in the western section of the extensive grounds.
The excavators were not long in coming upon the broken walls of a ruined church, and, judging from the extent of the walls unearthed, this church must have enjoyed quite liberal dimensions. It measures some 150 feet in length from entrance to apse, the latter facing eastwards, and its average width at the nave is about 50 feet and at the transepts, 80 feet.
The main floor of the nave still remains unearthed but those of the transepts, the extent of whose areas measures some 15 feet square each, have been exposed to view. They consist of beautifully laid mosaics in a perfect state of preservation. In the middle of the floor of the south transept is sunk a baptismal immersion pool, some 2 feet in depth and 4 feet square, with a nicely rounded and finished rim, all wonderfully preserved. The plastering on the sides of the walls enclosing this transept shows traces of a large painting.
On the floor of the north transept were found several shafts of columns scattered here and there among the debris, and at the junction of the western corner of the transept with the nave were uncovered two or three tombs containing human bones, on the tombstone of one of which is inscribed in Greek the name "Theodorus."
Further up the nave, northeast of the south transept, another bit of mosaic flooring was unearthed, disclosing that there were two separate and distinct floors of different mosaic design, the upper lying some 2 feet 6 inches above the other, making it clear that the church's history covers two separate periods, namely: The first period following its original construction by Queen Helena, mother of Constantine the Great—for there is now no doubt that this is one of the first three Christian churches built in the Holy Land by Queen Helena some time during the early part of the fourth century, the other two being the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem and the Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem;—and the second period dating from the restoration by the Crusaders of the twelfth century of the previously destroyed original church of Queen Helena, the destruction taking place probably during the early part of the sixth century at the hands of the Persian King, Chosroes II., or possibly some other Oriental vandal. The latter view is supported by the peculiar construction in a semi-circular fashion of the wall of the apse, which is characteristic of the Crusader type of church architecture.
The church has been given the name of "Eleona," in reference perhaps to Queen Helena, its founder, or again, the "Church of the Lord's Prayer," for it stands, as tradition has it, over the site of the spot where Jesus taught his disciples how to pray.
The work of excavation has been temporarily postponed because of a lack of the necessary funds, but it is the intention of the "White Fathers," so-called because of the white robes or tunics which they wear, to continue their explorations as soon as possible, and at some future date to restore the church to its original grandeur.

MINER COUGHS UP SCREW.
Man Condemned as Consumptive Rids System of 'Disease' in Jiffy.
STOCKTON, Cal., Dec. 6.—After hemorrhages in the past two years and after having been declared a consumptive with little chance of recovery, Calib Womble, a miner of Calaveras, coughed up a rusty screw that had been lodged in his lungs for years, as he declared it must have been swallowed in his early childhood.
Physicians said that the screw had caused the tuberculosis symptoms.

HIGH COST OF LIVING PROBE

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 6.—"The consumer pays a dollar for food, the farmer gets less than fifty cents of it. Who gets the rest?"
That is a question which Secretary Wilson of the Department of Agriculture asked today in his annual report. The Secretary does not attempt to answer it. He does explain in some detail the results of an investigation his department has just concluded into the effect of cold storage on the wholesomeness and cost of food. His investigation leads him to recommend publicity for the amount of food in cold storage, just as the Department now gives publicity to the condition of crops from month to month.
Instead of food remaining in cold storage for longer than a year or two as a rule, the Secretary declares that this investigation showed that "receipts into cold storage are entirely or very nearly exhausted by the deliveries out of cold storage within ten months."
Long storage is the exception, the Secretary asserts. Warehousemen explained to the Department that excessively long storage was due to lawsuits and other circumstances of an uncommercial nature. The cost of storage, including storage charge, interest and insurance, is considered as a carrier to a long storage.
Cold storage, the Secretary reports, has raised the cost of living by increasing the annual price level for butter and eggs.
The Secretary says that an examination of the record of prices gives a "suspicion" that there has been much speculation in some years by the men who keep commodities in cold storage.
He refers to "an apparent mistake" of the storage men in overestimating the consumption of eggs by the public at exorbitant prices last winter with the result that in the spring the storage men had to sell eggs at remarkably low prices and send abroad the largest amount of eggs ever exported in order to get rid of the supply.
The Secretary declares that the warehousemen ought to be required to send to Washington each month the amount of commodities placed in storage so that the public may be able to judge of the future trend of prices.
A great variety of subjects is dealt with by the Secretary in the report. He says that the day is not far distant when the United States will cease to import potash, Florida, Kentucky, Tennessee and Idaho are mentioned as depositories.
Recommendation is made that all government agencies that conserve public health should be grouped together in one bureau.
The success of the Department in the Southern states, through object lessons in the fields is pronounced to have been such as to justify the extension of the work to all states.
The Department announces that the corn crop is moving Northward by seed selection.
The American systems of renting land are declared to be faulty and result in soil robbing. It is suggested that domestic animals be kept on farms, even if the land owner must furnish them, and that there be a rotation of crops.
After years of experimentation, the Department says that Egyptian cotton can be grown in Southern California and bulbs in the state of Washington.
The clayfish is pronounced to be a serious pest in the South. Carbon bisulphide is said to be a sure remedy.
The finest dates from the Sahara desert succeed in the southwestern states.
Poultry products for the past year are estimated to have been worth \$750,000,000.
The foresters of the Forestry Bureau are learning by experiment how to reforest 30,000 acres in a year. The Secretary says that ten times this must be planted annually to cover all the bare acres in a general reforestation.
"We are sending explorers to the ends of the earth for new plants and getting them," says Secretary Wilson.
The Secretary warns the irrigation farmers that they must preserve their soil; that irrigation will bring maximum crops while the land is new and full of plant food. But when the crops are sold year by year, irrigation of itself will not assure good results.

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
