May Sell Roller—It is possible that the city of Marshfield will sell the old street roller to the Coos County commissioners. The city has little use for it and can sell it to the county, which is going to buy two or more rollers, under an agreement whereby the city can use it from time to time. City Attorney Goss called the matter to the attention of the council last night but no action was taken. The roller was one of the leading themes in the election two years ago and Mayor Straw said last evening when the matter was being discussed that he would really hate to see the roller disposed of.

Change Name.—San Francisco papers containing a legal notice for a called meeting of the stockholders of the Coos Bay and Eastern Railway company for the purpose of transferring its holdings to the Coos Bay and Eastern Railway company to be held there this week, have been received here. It is presumed that the meeting was merely to change the name of the project from an electric to a steam project.
