BEND ELECTION IS QUESTIONED

Charge made that Carloads of Laborers Were brought in and Voted

BEND, Ore., Dec. 12.—The general election, the first under the new charter, was held last week and was the warmest in the history of the town. For mayor, Dr. U. C. Coe, and the entire list of councilmen on his ticket were re-elected. The vote was more than double that ever cast in Bend before, totaling 297. The council met Wednesday to canvass the returns of the election and adjourned to give time to make an investigation of the vote cast. Gross fraud and illegal voting will be charged and the present council may refuse to ratify the election. It is stated that the judges of the election were misled and carloads of laborers, run in from the Deschutes, 10 miles below, voted during the noon hour while there was practically no one at the polls. During this one hour, there were more than 80 votes cast.

LUMBER TRADE IS BRIGHTER

Improvement is Shown in the Demand for Lumber

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 12.—The official report of the National Lumber Manufacturer's Association for October, just issued by Manager Leonard Bronson, of Tacoma, shows a slight improvement in the general lumber demand, and a slight excess of shipments over the cut of Washington and Oregon, so far as the mills reporting are concerned.

The October report is the most representative yet issued under the association's new publicity scheme, 745 mills being heard from representing 25 states, an improvement of nearly 200 mills and of two states over September. The mills reporting represented at territory producing 911,000,000 feet of lumber during October. In general, it was shown from the report that an increase of nearly 3 per cent in shipments over cut was made. Some of the Eastern states however, seem to have abandoned their conservative systems of cutting, and the report in these states shows a gain in cut over shipments.

The lumber situation in the Pacific Northwest, according to the report, was in slightly better shape during October than in September, the mills reporting from Washington and Oregon particularly showing a slight excess of shipments over cut, due to the policy of curtailment adopted. In some cases Manager Bronson states that the mills are still producing far more than the demand, and consequently no improvement in prices can be expected until they, too, adopt the curtailment policy.

California mills reporting show an excess of cut for October over September, but this is because the winter stock is being laid in, as many of the interior mills close down for winter.

MAKES VERY FINE RECORD

San Francisco Paper Praises Work of the Nann Smith.

The San Francisco Examiner contains the following:

"According to figures just submitted by the owners of the steamer Nann Smith, Captain Olsen, it is claimed that the days of the small steam schooner in the coastwise lumber carrying trade will soon cease. The Nann Smith has been running for some months between here and Coos Bay, making, on an average, one trip each week. Capable of carrying a 1,600,000-foot cargo, the vessel is conveying to this market the same amount of lumber that is being handled by five average steam schooners.

"Although no estimate of the profits has been given out, it is said that the proportionate cost per thousand is not more than one-half that of the smaller ships. It also has been proven in the case of the Nann Smith that a good deep draft and strongly constructed steel vessel can pass over a rough bar with perfect impunity, which cannot be accomplished by the small wooden steam schooners.

"While the Nann Smith has been passing in and out over the Coos Bay bar without delay, other places along the coast, especially Eureka, have caused considerable delay in the shipping of these places. During the last month, during a season of rough bar at Humboldt, as many as ten or twelve ships have been bar-bound at a time. This has caused delay in the mail and passenger service, to say nothing of the tying up of the cargoes of lumber, and has cost the owners of the different ships large sums through the delay."
