MINISTER IS ACCUSED OF INSPIRING DYNAMITE PLOTS

Chas. M. Brewer of Okla., Arrested for Conspiracy Today.

INVOLVED IN SOLDIER'S CONFESSION

Accused Private Says He and Others Caused Disaster at Fort Riley.

JUNCTION CITY, Kan., Dec. 13.—Chas. M. Brewer, formerly chaplain in the United States army, but pastor of a Baptist church in Tulsa, Okla., was accused, it developed today, in a confession by a private Quirk of implication in a series of explosions which baffled the military authorities at Fort Riley for six months.

Mrs. Anne Jordan, also implicated in Quirk's confession, was also arrested in Kansas City.

Quirk in his confession said the explosion on the bridge across the Kaw river on June 4, blew up the cavalry barracks and destroyed and also blew the water main which supplied the army post with water.

Quirk declared he committed the crime at the instigation of Brewer who sought revenge because he was court-martialed and dismissed from service for conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman.

Mrs. Jordan is the wife of an convict in the federal prison at Leavenworth. She was arrested here several months ago for aiding her husband to escape from the prison house where he was confined on a charge of stealing.

BEAT CHARTER AMENDMENTS

North Bend Votes Down the Changes Sought by Terminal Railway—Winsor Wins.

The above summarizes the results of the annual city election in North Bend yesterday. In all, 374 votes were cast.

The defeat of the charter amendments was not unexpected as expressions had been adverse to the proposed changes. This will mean that the Terminal Railway will have to take a franchise subject to the gross earning tax and other restrictions or another special election will have to be called to vote on it again.

TO HAVE MEN RESPONSIBLE

Geo. W. Perkins Advocates New Idea in Regulating National Corporations.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—George W. Perkins, financier and director of the United States Steel Corporation today urged before the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee a plan for a general commission with power to license corporations doing interstate or international business, with the power to punish the individuals of such corporations for violation of law, rather than the revocation of license.

TAFT BACK OF CONSPIRACY PROBE

President Started Federal Investigation of Dynamite Plot Involving McNamaras.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 13.—President Taft personally has set in motion the government's present investigation both here and in Indianapolis into the dynamiting conspiracy in which the McNamara brothers figured.

President Taft visited Los Angeles October 16 and was then fully informed by Oscar Lawler, then an associate of District Attorney John D. Fredericks of the case built up against the McNamaras. President Taft set in motion the machinery of the present federal investigation within forty-eight hours after he left Los Angeles.

RIVAL LINES MAKING HASTE

Delhi With Princess Royal and Family of England Is Stranded Early Today.

OTHER VESSELS SAVE ALL THOSE ON BOARD

Disaster Occurs at Cape Spartel, Near Gibraltar During Severe Storm.

GIBRALTAR, Dec. 13.—The Steamer Delhi, London for Bombay, conveying the Princess Royal Louise Victoria Alexandra Dagmar, sister of King George V. with her husband, the Duke of Fife, and her daughters and many other passengers on the way to Egypt, is ashore south of the Cape of Spartel on the Moroccan coast, at the entrance of the Straits of Gibraltar.

Severe Storm Rages. A storm was raging and it was difficult for rescue vessels to get close to the Delhi, but with the assistance of the French cruiser Friant, the women and children were taken off the stranded Delhi and landed. Duke of Fife remained on board.

The Princess Royal and family were not rescued by the Friant but were taken off the Delhi in a life boat and landed at Cape Spartel. From there they proceeded overland to Tangier where they went aboard a warship and proceeded to Gibraltar.

RAPS RUSSIA BEFORE HOUSE

Representative Sulzer Wants America to Abrogate Treaty With Czar.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Abrogation of the Russian treaty of 1832 because of race and religious discrimination in granting passports to American citizens, is demanded in resolutions framed by Representative Sulzer of New York and Senator Culberson of Texas, discussed in a speech in the House today by Sulzer, who is chairman of the Foreign Affairs committee which unanimously reported this bill favorably.
