**New Launch.**—Dr. R. H. Walter has just completed the hull of what promises to be one of the best launches on the Bay. The craft is 22 feet long and will be equipped with a five-horse power gasoline engine.

**Build Manhole.**—Street Commissioner Lawhorne is having a new brick manhole put at Front and Market streets today. The old one was too small and the sewer was stopped up. A brick manhole is being constructed.

**Guests at Luncheon.**—Mrs. Frank Rogers is entertaining a number of Marshfield ladies at a luncheon at her home on South Coos River today. The party left here this morning in Mrs. W. F. Miller's launch, "The Beaver."

**Fine Potatoes.**—Mrs. Elizabeth Adams today placed on exhibit at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce some of the finest specimens of this year's potatoes that have been seen. They are unusually large and are products of her Coos River ranch.

**Named Referee.**—R. O. Graves and C. R. Peck, the attorneys in the \$20,000 damage suit of Jordan Schappers vs. the Simpson Lumber company, have agreed upon Ira B. Riddle, official court reporter, as referee whose evidence in the case will be taken.

**Ferry Traffic.**—The ferry transit plying between Eastside and Marshfield during the month of November handled a big business. Capt. Alex Hall reports that the traffic carried consisted of 3,604 passengers, 110 double teams, 223 single teams, 37 head of stock and eight autos.

**Funeral Sunday.**—W. B. Curtis received a telegram today stating that the body of J. M. Davis, the well known Coos Bay pioneer who died at Santa Anna, Calif., a few days ago, had been shipped on the Homer leaving for Coos Bay today. The funeral services will be held from Wilson's Chapel in Marshfield at 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

**Plan Next Contest.**—It is announced that the next step in the fight against the creation of the Port of Port Orford will be an application for an injunction restraining the Port Commission there from levying a tax for the maintenance of a port. The commissioners are to be named by Gov. West soon and it is said there will be a lively contest over it. When the latter injunction is secured, the case will probably be threshed out on its merits, that is whether Port Orford is a harbor within the meaning of the state law or is merely an open roadstead of the high sea.

**Many Autos.**—According to a report just issued by Secretary of State Olcott of Oregon, Coos County towns have their share of the automobiles. The report says Bandon has five cars, Empire one, North Bend seven, Myrtle Point thirteen, Coquille thirty-eight and Marshfield thirty-two. Estimating the average cost at \$1,200 per car, Sec. Olcott appraises the value of the cars at \$106,400. Curry county is the only county in Oregon which is not credited with having at least one machine. The state number plates for 1912 will have a green background with black figures.

**Talk of Candidates.**—Considerable interest is being aroused by the special school election to be held next Monday night at which a director or will be elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of C. J.

Mills. E. D. McArthur was being strongly talked of today but it is not known whether he will consent to being a candidate. A. T. Haines is also being mentioned by friends for the place. The meeting will also fix the school levy for the ensuing year and it will probably be nine and one half or ten mills, a reduction of one or one and one half mills from last year.

**No Money Found.**—It was reported last evening that Billy Hill, a lad had found some molten coin while playing around the A. C. Gabernaene home which was destroyed by fire Sunday night. Marshal Carter investigated the matter and says the substance found was merely molten glass and copper.

**Weds Christmas Day.**—J. H. Bridges will leave in a day or two via Bandon for Los Angeles where on Christmas day he will attend the marriage of his daughter, Miss E. Faye Bridges, to Frank Halliday, manager of the branch of the National Cash Register company at Bakersfield, Calif. The ceremony will take place at the Bridges' home in Los Angeles. The newly-weds will make an extended eastern honeymoon trip and will make their home at Bakersfield. Mr. and Mrs. Bridges will come to Marshfield soon after the holidays to make their home. Miss Bridges is well known on Coos Bay, having made her home here for over a year, and the host of friends that the charming and accomplished young woman made here will unite in congratulating Mr. Halliday and in wishing that the couple may soon come to Coos Bay to make their home.
