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THOUGHTS OF CHRISTMAS BRING BACK JUROR WHO DESERTED

Harry Waldron, Mentally Unbalanced by Ordeal, Returns Wan and Weary.

WANDERED AIMLESSLY TWO DAYS AND NIGHTS

Judge Porterfield Dismisses Jury and Orders New One—Will Not Punish Waldron.

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 14.—Pale, emaciated and weak from hunger and exposure, Harry Waldron, the juror whose escape last Sunday night blocked the progress of the second trial of Dr. B. Clarke Hyde on the charge of murdering Col. Thomas Swope, returned to his home today.

Waldron said after he left the room in the hotel, he knew he had done wrong, but fears of fine and punishment got the better of him and he did not return.

Thoughts of Christmas and a desire to spend it with his family drove him home. He slept in a barn last night and this morning went home.

Judge Porterfield intimated that Waldron might not be punished. Judge Porterfield dismissed the Hyde jury this afternoon and fixed the date of the new trial as January 2, 1912.

He said Waldron was insane at the time he escaped and still was insane.

ROYAL PARTY IS RECOVERING

English Nobility Recuperating From Ill Effects of Ship Wreck.

GIBRALTAR, Dec. 14.—All members of the royal party comprising the Princess Royal, the Duke of Pife and their daughters who suffered such terrible experiences during their landing from the wreck of the steamer Delhi off Cape Spartel yesterday, are reported well today, although they are much exhausted.

The captain of the Delhi in a wireless message expressed the fear that he would have to abandon the ship and asked for a strong guard to be sent. The ship carries bullion worth \$1,500,000.

REYES IS MISSING.

NEW ROAD TO ARE AWARDED COME TO BAY THE CONTRACT

Col. R. H. Rosa of Bandon Hears That Hawley System Is Headed This Way.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

That the Hawley system, owners of the Minneapolis and St. Louis Railway, the Iowa Central and several other roads, is looking to Coos Bay as the Pacific Coast terminus of a new transcontinental line is the news that Col. R. H. Rosa brought here today from Portland.

Edwin Hawley, since the death of E. H. Harriman, has been rated as the leader of the Wall Street group of railroad magnates. He has recently been pushing the Minneapolis and St. Louis Railway which, in connection with the Iowa Central, extends northerly from St. Louis and Perla across Iowa to the Twin Cities and thence westerly into South Dakota.

Col. Rosa said that everybody in Portland is booming the Coos Bay country. He heard much railroad talk. He met R. A. Booth of Eugene and in talking over the Southern Pacific's extension from Eugene to Coos Bay gained the impression that Mr. Booth did not believe that the Southern Pacific would rush the completion of the line as far as Coos Bay unless some other road forced them to.

Col. Rosa with Assessor T. J. Thrift appeared before the Oregon State Equalization Board to protest against any further increase in Coos county valuations by that body. He said that the land board had figures showing the prices at which various pieces of land had been sold recently and in contrast with them the assessed figures. He said that State Treasurer Kay assured him there would be no further increase in Coos county values by the state.

KNOCKS OUT EVIDENCE.

Testimony of Chicago Lawyer About Bribery Stricken Out.

FOUR PEOPLE FOUND SLAIN

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 14.—The entire family of Mrs. Mary A. Morner, a widow, her daughters, Edith, aged twenty, and Blanche, aged seventeen, a son, Arthur, aged 28, were murdered Tuesday on the Morner farm near DeFreestville, about twenty miles from here.

The bodies of the women were found last night near the barn hacked with a hatchet, battered with a club and thrown into a pit. The body of the son with the throat cut and otherwise mutilated was found today under the barn floor. The police today are searching for an Italian farm hand who is missing.

FURNISHED FEDERAL GRAND JURY

Indianapolis Probe of Alleged McNamara Conspiracy Begins Today.

GREAT VOLUME OF EVIDENCE IS FOUND

Claim That Crimes Were Perpetrated in Seventeen States In Past Year.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 14.—The federal grand jury which is to probe the alleged conspiracy whereby explosives were carried into many states to blow up bridges and other structures erected by firms employing non-union men, formally began deliberations today.

Years of correspondence and other papers taken from the office formerly occupied by John J. McNamara, the convicted secretary and treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers is in possession of District Attorney Miller and former clerks and stenographers of McNamara will be called before the jury.

A number of detectives and union officials will be summoned to tell what they may know of the alleged dynamite plots.

TO CANCEL TREATY.

Expect Senate to Take Early Action on Russian Resolution.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 14.—As a result of an understanding reached here today, it is believed the Senate will pass before the Christmas holidays the House resolution terminating the 1832 treaty with Russia because of discrimination against American Jewish citizens.

RECALL NO GOOD.

Such Is the Opinion of Attorney-General Crawford.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 14.—That the recall amendment to the Oregon constitution is inoperative and ineffectual because it is not self-executing is the opinion of Attorney-General Crawford, handed down by R. H. Howell, county clerk of Lincoln county, who requested information on the point because of a move on foot in that county to circulate recall petitions against the county judge and county commissioners.

The opinion is sweeping in its nature and declares that the recall provision is not self-executing and that further legislative enactment is required before the recall amendment will become effective.
