SECEDE FROM NORTH BEND

B. F. Wyatt Contends in Suit That Kinney Additions Weren't Legally Absorbed

The long talked of effort of Plat B and the associate Kinney additions to secede from North Bend has finally been launched in a case just started in circuit court. The case is begun by B. F. Wyatt to enjoin Sheriff Gage as the Coos county tax collector from collecting the North Bend municipal taxes on his properties in the Kinney additions on the ground that they were not legally taken into the North Bend municipality. The property involved includes Plat B, a tract about three quarters of a mile wide in the southerly part of North Bend, Plat C, just west of Plat B, Plat E where the Kinney sawmill and Rapid Transit buildings are located, Plat D and Bangor additions.

The suit is based on alleged technical defects in the special election May 27, 1907, under which North Bend absorbed the district in question, the voters of the city of North Bend as well as the voters of the district annexed deciding by a substantial majority in favor of the consolidation. A dozen or so alleged defects in the call for the election, the qualifying of election officials, etc., are given, besides the claim that the city of North Bend has not improved the streets and made other town improvements in the annexed section that are alleged to have been made one of the conditions of the consolidation.

When the secession was first talked of, it was understood that Major Kinney himself would personally be behind the suit. Whether Mr. Wyatt is instituting the test suit in the Kinney interests is not known.
