BANDON LOSES TO MARSHFIELD

Local High School Team Wins Basketball Game 13 to 9 Last Night.

The Marshfield High school basketball team finally broke its long losing streak last night and defeated the Bandon High school here by the score of 13 to 9. Marshfield simply outplayed the visitors. Their team work was excellent and by their rapid underhand passing seemed to have Bandon bewildered most of the time.

The team shows great improvement over any bunch that has ever represented Marshfield, and great credit is due Coach Grannis for the fine work he has done. It is hard to turn a bunch of football players into basketball stars in one season and it is only by his efforts that this has been accomplished. The teams started off with a rush in the first half. Marshfield rushed the ball down to her own basket but a foul was called before they could attempt a throw. Gallier threw a basket from foul and the score stood 1 to 0 in favor of Bandon. Shortly after this, Bandon threw another foul. Marshfield then took a spurt and threw a field basket and two fouls making the score 4 to 2 in their favor. Toward the close of the half, Bandon got a field basket and tied the score.

In the second half, Marshfield opened up and took the lead, holding it through the rest of the game. The result, however, was never certain until the last whistle was blown. Bandon showed bursts of speed occasionally, at one time taking the ball the length of the floor and shooting a basket without interference. Only speed was only momentary, however, Marshfield outplaying them most of the time.

For Marshfield, Sidney B. Clarke was easily the star, making 9 of Marshfield's 13 points; two field baskets, 1 laid, 1; Gallier, 1; fields goals 7 tries.

Beverly and Stutsman also played a good game at passing and at defense.

Now that the Marshfield boys know what they are capable of doing, their work will doubtless improve and they promise to be contenders in the championship roll. The race, however, will be a hard one.
