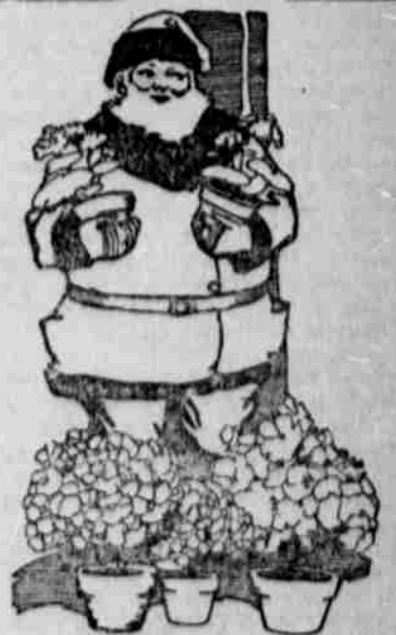
Vote Road Tax.—The voters of the Allegany road district at a special election Saturday voted a special six mill tax levy to raise \$4,500 to plank the Allegany-Scottsburg road next summer. The special levy carried by a vote of thirty-one to twenty-eight.
