LIVELY FINISH OF LOCAL BOUT

Boxing Match Almost Results in Rough House—Chinaman Put out on Foul

The boxing carnival at the Marshfield Skating Rink Saturday night came near ending in a free-for-all and the feeling engendered by the termination of the main bout between "Chuck" O'Connell and Sing Hosan, the Beaver Hill Chinaman, has not fully died out yet.

Sing Hosan had all the best of it up to the eighth round. Soon after they were called from their corners in the eighth, "Chuck" O'Connell, according to the big majority of the audience, deliberately landed below the belt. The Chinaman dropped in a heap on the floor. Referee Pressler started to count him out. He had counted five of the fatal ten when Jess Day jumped over the ropes and picked up the prostrate Chinaman and carried him to his corner.

Pressler still insisted on giving the bout to O'Connell as a knockout, but finally Dr. Horsfall was summoned to resuscitate the Chinaman, and after an examination, sustained the contention of the crowd that Sing Hosan had been struck below the belt.

Then Referee Pressler declared all bets off and called the bout a draw. He claimed that the Chinaman had fouled O'Connell early in the bout by striking him when the latter was down.

The crowd's sympathy was with Sing Hosan. It was the first time the Chinaman had ever trained for a go and he showed up in excellent form. He was strong and quick, following up openings better than any pugilist that has yet been developed on the Bay.

In the first round, Sing Hosan set so fast a pace that O'Connell did not have much more than a look in. In the second, he landed a terrific left to O'Connell's mouth and the latter clinched to save himself. The clinch was prolonged. Referee Pressler not stopping it until O'Connell had regained his strength.

Today, John Herron, manager of the boxing bouts, said that he wished to state that he had absolutely nothing to do with it after the fight started. He said that he had money bet on O'Connell and after the first round didn't think he had a look in.

Generally the fight fans are scoring Pressler for his decision of "no contest." They declare that under every rule of the game, the fight should have been awarded to Sing Hosan.

Prior to the main event, Billy Wilson of Marshfield and Art Fish of Coquille boxed four rounds. Jess Day and Earl Henderson also boxed four rounds. There was a fairly good house.

Arrange New Bouts.
This afternoon, Manager Herron announced that he had arranged for twenty-eight rounds of sparring at the Marshfield Skating Rink on the afternoon of Christmas day. Bud Anderson of Portland is matched with Earl Henderson for twenty rounds and Chuck O'Connell is to meet Sing Hosan for eight rounds.

Manager Herron stated that he had secured Mayor Straw's permission to permit women to attend the go. The mayor, he said, had granted this permit on condition that the club would pay four special officers, which he will name, to maintain strict order around the ring.

TO GET PURE WATER SUPPLY

Klamath Falls City Officials Take Action to Get Pure Water There

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Dec. 18.—There will be no more typhoid germs for the people of this city if the council has its way. It has been some months since the agitation over the impure city water was started, and the city officials tried in every possible way to induce the water company to get pure water, but the last analysis shows that it is still unfit for drinking purposes. The council has taken the preliminary steps to get better water, and an ordinance has been passed which provides for acquiring a water-right in the vicinity of Aspen lake, on the west side of the Upper Klamath lake, 20 miles from this city. There are several large springs in this locality, and it has been determined that the water can be piped here and distributed by a gravity system.

Mayor Sanderson and the council aim to get the water and take all necessary steps for the establishment of a municipal system. It is not known what action the Siskiyou Light and Power company, which now owns the water system in this city, will take in regard to improving the water supply. The company made several experiments, but all of them proved unsuccessful. The announcement was recently made that the company would do nothing further until it was granted a new franchise. The action of the council would indicate that there will be no new franchise and that if the necessary bonds can be floated the city will have a municipal water system.

FILE APPEAL IN PORT CASE

ACTION BY STATE OF OREGON ATTACKING SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE TAKEN TO SUPREME COURT.

Notice was served today of the appeal of the case of the State of Oregon vs. the Port of Coos Bay, involving the question of the legality of the election. The case is being appealed by L. A. Liljeqvist, prosecuting attorney, on condition that J. W. Bennett defray the expenses of the appeal. Mr. Bennett informed Mr. Liljeqvist that his clients were paying the expense.

The attorneys have sixty days or until about February 1 to file their briefs in the case with the supreme court and it will be argued before that tribunal sometime in March probably, if both sides agree to a request for the Supreme Court to advance it on the calendar. If it is argued in March, it is hoped to get a decision about April 1. This is the last of the port cases which is causing a delay of the projected harbor improvements.

Had it not been for Mr. Bennett arranging for the expenses of the appeal, the case would have been definitely settled six months after the decision in the lower court. It would have been too late to appeal and no one except the state of Oregon, which would then have forfeited its privilege would have the right to raise the questions involved.
