Give Farewell.—The Crab club will tender a farewell party this evening at the home of C. W. Montgomery in West Marshfield for A. J. Ness who will leave tomorrow for Portland.

Meet Tonight.—The Marshfield Lodge of Elks will meet tonight. It will be the last meeting for two weeks, owing to the Masonic lodges desiring the hall next Wednesday evening for some special work.

Close One Day.—The C. A. Smith mills will be closed just one day for Christmas this year. The mills will close Saturday evening and resume operations Tuesday morning, according to a statement given out by Supt. Murch today.

Bring Body Here.—E. R. Colgan and Roy Abbott left this morning for Bandon where they will meet the body of Mrs. Myrtle Johnson which is being shipped here from San Francisco for burial. The funeral announcement will be made later.

Due Soon.—The M. S. Dollar, the big lumber carrier of the Dollar Steamship company is scheduled to arrive here the last of the week to take on about 2,000,000 feet of a cargo of 3,000,000 feet for Shanghai, China. This is one of the first of several cargoes for China which the Smith mill will ship in the near future.

Build House.—A. P. Owen is erecting a fine modern residence at Eleventh and Commercial which will be occupied by Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Harrigan. He will also erect a fine garage there and Mr. and Mrs. Harrigan will leave shortly for Portland to purchase the machine which will be Santa Claus' gift to them.

To Levy Tax.—The Eastside school board will meet Friday evening to fix the tax levy for the ensuing year for that district. It is expected that the tax levy will be three mills. The municipal levy there for the year has been fixed at eight mills so that it will make the total tax levy of Eastside this year thirty-one mills or two mills less than a year ago.
