School Close.—The Marshfield public schools will close tomorrow for a two weeks vacation for the Christmas holidays.

Christmas Tree.—The annual Christmas tree exercises of the Marshfield Methodist church will be held Saturday night at the church.

Ship Lumber.—The railroad yards are holding a large number of cars loaded with lumber from the Coquille Lumber Co.'s mills, awaiting the arrival of the steamer Hazel Dollar when the lumber will be transferred directly onto the steamer.

Exhibit Work.—Art exhibits have been arranged at the Central and High school buildings for tomorrow so that patrons attending the Christmas programs in the various grades will have opportunity to view the work done by the pupils.

Will Give Ball.—The Millcoma association is issuing invitations for a ball to be given at the club Saturday evening, December 30, for members only and their ladies. The affair is in charge of the House Committee which is composed of Messrs. J. Albert Matson, C. E. Nicholson and C. F. McKnight.

Railroad Ties Bought.—The Southern Pacific Railroad Company has lately been buying up large quantities of ties in this district. It is not known whether this material is intended for shipment by steamer, or gathered for some future improvement or extension of the company's lines. The quantities are far above present local demands.

Reopen Mine.—Geo. Gage of the Riverton Mine was in Marshfield yesterday on business. He says that the San Francisco companies which recently leased it plan to reopen it early in January. The Consolidated Fuel Company and Stafford and Company are the firms and they expect to ship the output which will be about 175 tons daily to San Francisco on the vessels Acme and Arcata.
