DOWNFALL OF MANCHU DYNASTY IN CHINA IS EXPECTED SOON

Abdication of Emperor Is Expected to Quickly Follow Conference.

REBELS NOT WILLING TO EXTEND ARMISTICE

Fear That Imperialists Will Take Advantage of Delay to Strengthen Themselves.

SHANGHAI, Dec. 27.—An informal meeting between Wu Tingfang and Tang Shao Ki took place today when Premier Yuan's proposal to submit the future form of government to a special National Assembly was considered.

CALL PRINCES TO MEET (By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times)

PEKIN, Dec. 27.—The Emperor has summoned the leading princes of the imperial clan to meet Premier Yuan Shi Kai to discuss the proposal made at the Shanghai Conference.

In this case, the power of Manchus will not last many weeks. The attitude of the imperialist delegates to the Shanghai convention, coupled with the discontent of certain Manchu factions which profess doubt as to Yuan's loyalty are motives given for his possible retirement.

NEW WITNESSES ARE SUMMONED FOR IT

Members of Seattle Colony Alleged to Have Secreted Kaplan and Schmidt.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 27.—

When the federal grand jury reassembled today after the holiday recess, it became evident the dynamite conspiracy investigation at once, would continue the probe for some time longer.

It is learned that six additional subpoenas have been issued during the holiday recess, all for persons residing in or near Seattle.

One of the summons is to George Haley, business agent of the pile-drivers Union at Seattle.

The other five will be served on members of the Home Colony, a settlement in which Kaplan and Schmidt, alleged confederates of James B. McNamara in the destruction of the Times' building are said to have taken refuge for a time following the explosion here.

Haley, according to a message received here, is in Canada and consequently has not been served with the federal subpoena.

WILL TRY FRANKLIN. Alleged Brother of McNamara Trial Juror Is Committed.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 27.—

Without having attempted any defense, counsel for Bert H. Franklin, a former investigator for the McNamara brothers, allowed their client to be committed today for trial in the superior court on the charge of having bribed Robert Bain, a sworn juror in the McNamara trial.

No bail was fixed as Franklin is already under a \$10,000 bond for trial on the charge of having attempted to bribe George Lockwood, a venireman summoned in the McNamara case.

EXPLOSIVES ARE FOUND. Dynamite and Caps Discovered in Case at Rochester, Pa.

ROCHESTER, Pa., Dec. 27.—

Twenty-four sticks of dynamite and twelve caps wrapped in cotton, and ten yards of fuse, securely packed in a case evidently made for the purpose and resembling an ordinary traveling bag were found in the barns of McDonald and Hariman dealers in contractors supplies, today by Albert Wilhelm, a clerk in the firm's employ.

The find was turned over to the police who learned that the case also contained a long paper knife bearing the name of a Philadelphia company. The police recognized the bag as one seen in the hands of a stranger several days ago. Since finding the quantity of explosive on the Pittsburg and Lake Erie railroad across the Ohio river from here several months ago, said to have been planted by agents of the McNamaras, the police have been active and the bridge is guarded night and day.

NEW OUTBREAK IN PERSIA NOW

Revolution Against Constitution Starts in Tabriz and New Ruler Chosen.

TABRIZ, Persia, (via St. Petersburg), Dec. 27.—A mob of reactionaries, after demonstrating against the constitution today destroyed the building of the Constitutional club, then proceeded to the residence of Shua Ed Dowleh, a former cabinet minister, and requested him to assume the administration of the province of Azerbaijan. It is reported he will accept.

SHUSTER READY TO QUIT.

TEHERAN, Persia, Dec. 27.—W. Morgan Shuster, the American treasurer-general, is still here awaiting the nomination of a successor to whom he can hand over the functions of the office. The populace, which holds Shuster in great esteem, are much incensed against the act of the Cabinet in dismissing him. Many written protests have been sent to the authorities.
