**Seek Platinum**—Parties at Coquille are reported to be organizing a company to try to develop reported platinum deposits along the lower Coquille. Considerable platinum has been found there in the past but the deposits have been small and scattered.

**Get More Eggs**—Superintendent F. W. Smith of the Coos River Hatchery says that he has now secured about 5,000,000 salmon eggs and is hopeful of securing more soon. The freshets on the Coquille this fall have not been sufficient to bring the salmon up as far as the hatchery and he fears that no eggs may be secured there this fall.

**For Substitutes**—Director Fenton of the Coos Bay Concert Band stated today that a mistaken impression had been gained from the recent announcement about certain members of the band who made the trip on the Boston being reimbursed. The only men who received anything besides the \$1.18 per day allowed by the government were some special musicians who had to be hired to take the places of regular members of

the band who could not go. This was explained and arranged for before the band went after the Boston.

**Thunderstorm**—Last evening Coos Bay experienced one of the few thunder storms that occur here, several loud claps occurring during the night.

**No Meeting Tonight**—The Marshfield Lodge of Elks will not meet this evening, the hall being desired by other lodges for a meeting. The Elks will meet a week from tonight.

**Band Concert**—The Coos Bay Concert Band will give a New Year's concert at the Masonic Opera House next Monday afternoon, according to announcement made by Director Fenton this afternoon. A special program being arranged for.

**Heavy Rainfall**—Coos Bay last night experienced one of the heaviest rainfalls of the season. The total precipitation from 4 o'clock yesterday until this morning was 1.30 inches, according to government records. A cold southerly wind made it most disagreeable. The rainfall for the year to-date is below the average.

**Need Licenses**—Deputy Game Warden Thomas wishes the attention of hunters and fishermen called to the fact that the Oregon law provides that all hunting and fishing licenses expire the first of the year, next Monday, and parties participating in either sport after that date must have new licenses. The law no longer permits hunting or fishing on receipts for applications for licenses but requires that the licenses must be in the possession of the sportsmen.
