behalf of P. A. Sandberg and revived the old controversy over the payment of Mr. Sandberg's claim for salary during the time Mayor Straw and the council were at "loggerheads" over the discharge of Sandberg. Mr. Peck said that Mr. Sandberg wanted him to sue the city for \$100, two-thirds of a month's salary. He said that Mr. Sandberg had reported to him that City Attorney Goss had reported this claim was owing. Mr. Goss stated that he had not so reported.

Mayor Straw asked the councilmen what they thought about it. Messrs. Coke, Cople and Ferguson declared that the council had passed on Sandberg's claim once and that settled it. Mr. Coke said that he would never vote to pay Sandberg fifty cents on the claim because he felt that it was not due him.

Councilman Powers said that he had voted originally to pay Sandberg \$100 in order to ward off a lawsuit and that he had not changed his mind.

Finally Mayor Straw dismissed the matter saying that three of the councilmen were going to vote against allowing the claim and that there was no use burdening the records with it. Mr. Peck did not say whether he would institute suit to collect the claim.

Franchise is Dropped

G. W. Carlton in behalf of Manager Schetter of the Western Union appeared and asked an extension of one year in the A. D. T. franchise which was granted the company last year. He said that they had not been able to do the \$1,000 worth of work on the system that the franchise provided but that twenty-eight electric clocks had been ordered by local business houses and would be put in as soon as the company could get around to it.

With the exception of Councilmen Savage and Powers, the council was opposed to granting any further extension of the franchise, saying that it wasn't right to have the city trifled with. Any way, it was stated that the company would get a franchise when it was ready to do business. Finally the matter was dropped without any extension being granted.

Let Street Contract

J. C. Doane was awarded the contract for cleaning and sprinkling the streets for the next six months. There were a number of bidders for the job but Mr. Doane was considerably the lowest. The bids were at the following rates:

- J. A. Arlandson—\$120.
- W. H. Lingo—\$105.
- Albert Abel—\$135.
- J. C. Doane—\$90.
- Matt Rankin—\$104.
- L. H. Heisner—\$117.

Mr. Doane will furnish a \$250 bond for the performance of the contract. A proposition made by E. F. Morrissey to Fire Chief Traver that he would furnish a \$700 team to the city for the next three months providing the city would care for it and be responsible for the animals, was rejected. The idea was that the city could hire a man to care for them and use the team to clean streets and to haul the fire engine to fires. The council took the position that the cost of arranging to keep the team three months would be more than they would save and any way they figured that if the city could not afford to own a team, they could not afford to keep one.

It was intimated that the city might during the next month arrange to secure a team for this work.
