J. W. RUSSELL and wife will leave soon for Tulare, Cal., where they expect to make their future home.

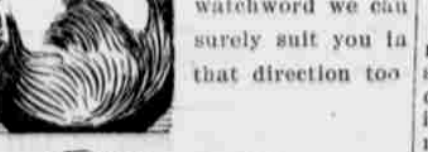
