

ATHLETICS IN HIGH SCHOOLS

Stricter Regulation Is Proposed by Superintendents in Oregon.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—Strict regulation of athletics in the high schools of the state was decided upon at the meeting of the State Association of City School Superintendents and every effort will be made to have this adopted. The resolutions provided that all participants in athletic contests between high schools shall be bona fide students in regular attendance; that such participants shall be making a passing grade in scholastic work equivalent to three regular studies and that beginning with the first semester of the school year of 1912-1913 such participants must have complied with scholastic requirements of the foregoing semester when last in school, with the exception of freshmen and special cases which would be subject to sensible adjustments.

Committee Named.

A committee composed of Superintendent Tiedgen, of Marshfield; Superintendent Coad of Hood River and Superintendent Gardner, of Forest Grove, was appointed to make further investigations into the athletics of the high schools and they will make further recommendations later.

The association also went on record as favoring the requirement of at least two years of industrial work and a year of bookkeeping in place of the half year at present. A review of the common branches was favored to be given during the last year of high school work and the requirement of a year of physiology at some time during the course, the student deciding when he wished to take it. In the course of physiology they favored the introduction of the study of sanitation, hygiene and sexual science.

The requirement of 15 units for graduation was favored. No change was advocated in the law regarding the certification of teachers in districts of the first class.

The association, which is made up at present of about 30 members, is open to all city superintendents and the heads of all schools employing six or more teachers. It was formed yesterday afternoon during the meeting of the Oregon Teachers' association.

HAS PREACHER MAYOR

Centralia Elects Pastor Head of New Commission
CENTRALIA, Wash., Jan. 2.—Rev. H. W. Thompson, for the past seven years pastor of the Presbyterian church here was elected mayor of Centralia by a majority of 175 over John Galvin, a former mayor and a capitalist. There were 1702 votes cast for mayor. Albert Sears and William Keir were elected commissioners. There three men will form the first commission to govern the city of Centralia. A hard fight was made on Rev. Mr. Thompson on the ground that he would oppose the licensing of saloons, but according to his statement during the campaign, since the people of the city had decided in favor of granting licenses, he would comply with their decision if elected, and until such time as the majority of the voters decided for a dry town.

CONNOR'S NEW VOCATION.

A Cottage Grove news item is as follows: "W. C. Connor, former editor of the Cottage Grove Leader and later of the Coquille Herald, has given up newspaper work and is going into goat raising. He has purchased the farm two miles west of this city known as the Branton place, consisting of 260 acres, and will secure a herd of Angora goats. He already owns a fine lot of high-grade poultry.
