The city ordinance provides as follows: "The owner or persons having in charge any dog kept or owned within the city of Marshfield shall on or before the first day of January in each year pay to the city recorder the sum of three dollars for each and every male dog; the sum of \$5.00 for each and every female dog. DROWNING AT GARDINER

Report that Jack Nelson of Life Saving Crew There Lost his Life
 A telephone message was received from Captain Henderson, keeper of the Umpqua river life saving station, saying that it is thought Jack Nelson had been drowned. The following are the circumstances as far as can be ascertained says the Florence West.

Jack has been at the station for some time as a member of the crew. Tuesday was his day off, and he went to Gardiner, leaving that town about 4 o'clock on his way back. Upon his failure to return to the station, Capt. Henderson made inquiries at Gardiner, and learning that Nelson had left town to return to the station the day before. Search was made and Nelson's boat was found bottom upwards a mile or so up the river from the station. A hat supposed to be his was also found.

Jack Nelson is a Suislaw boy and has lived here nearly all his life. He is a son of Mrs. Ivy Morris of Point Terrace, and is about 27 years old.
