Monday's Portland Telegram says: "When the steamer Breakwater, Captain Macgenn, arriving at Portland last evening, sailed from Coos Bay at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon the wind was blowing 60 miles an hour. Finally it shifted to the southwest and then to the northwest, changing again off Tillamook to the northeast. The Breakwater crossed into the Columbia river before daylight yesterday morning."

The Portland Oregonian has the following concerning the former captain of the Alliance: "Word has been received in the city that Captain Ed Parsons, who recently left the Port of Portland service as master of the tug Wallula, has entered that of the Puget Sound Tugboat Company, succeeding Captain Bailey on the tug Tatoosh. The latter is to go to Seattle for a short period, probably to take charge of a tug towing on the Alaska coast."

The Portland Telegram says: "When the Tillamook sails Monday night she will have aboard a mammoth logging engine, consigned to the Coquille Mill & Tug Company. It weighs 34,000 pounds. On the start the engine will form a part of the equipment being assembled for the building of a large municipal dock at Coquille. On its completion all of the seagoing vessels running into Coquille will operate from the dock."
