The proper time to spray fruit trees can be determined only by watching the fruit-buds and weather. The first application should be made before the first rain after the blossom-buds have been exposed, but before they have opened; the second, after two-thirds of the petals have fallen, being sure to get the mixture on ahead of the point and the third about two weeks later.

ROAD CONTRACT AWARDED TODAY

North Bend Contractors Will Improve Ferndale Highway to Marshfield.

Road Supervisor F. P. Norton has awarded the contracts for planking the Ferndale road between North Bend and Marshfield to Perkins and Jenkins of North Bend, the lowest bidders. The improvement will cost only \$11.75 per thousand feet of lumber used, much cheaper than similar improvements have cost elsewhere, it is claimed.

The work is to start at once and is to be rushed to completion. The bidders on the work were:

Perkins & Jenkins—For lumber \$10.25 per M. Hauling from Porter mill, 85 cents per M. Laying lumber 65 cents per M.

C. A. Smith Lumber Co.—\$12 per M for plank and \$11 per M for stringers.

W. E. Wilson—For laying lumber \$2 per M.

Emery & Son—\$1.10 per M for hauling.

B. B. Smith—\$1.49 per M for laying.

John Arlandson—\$2 per M for hauling and \$2 per M for laying.

L. H. Helsner—Ninety cents and \$1.15 per M for hauling.

John Evans—69 cents per M for laying lumber.
