#### STRIKE STILL IN PROGRESS.

Few Developments in Textile Workers Walkout in East.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.) LAWRENCE, Mass., Jan. 18—The seventh day of the strike in this city against the operation of the 54 hour law opened today with about one-third of the mill hands at work. The streets are still patrolled by the militia. There was no disturbance during the morning. The chances of settlement are not regarded as favorable.

This afternoon the condition was more favorable for an early settlement of the strike of the fifteen thousand textile workers.
