Here For Treatment.—Mr. Alexander from near Florence was brought to Mercy hospital yesterday for treatment. He has been very ill.

Find Body.—Word has been received here that the body of Mr. Hartshorne, the Oklahoma youth who lost his life by falling off the steamer Eva in the Umpqua a few days ago, was recovered. It was shipped to his old home in Oklahoma, the cousin who was with the young man at the time of the accident accompanying it. The young man's mother had started from Oklahoma but will be intercepted and notified that the body is being shipped back.

Wealthy Man Coming.—Word has been received that Hon. D. T. Flynn, for a number of years member of congress from Oklahoma and now rated as one of the wealthiest men in that state, will arrive here about February 1 to visit his old friend, Wm. Grimes. Mr. Flynn visited

here a few years ago and invested quite heavily in Coos Bay real estate. While here, he and Mr. Grimes will consider the advisability of erecting some fine buildings on some of their property.

Fear Storm.—The barometer today dropped to 29.32 where it remained for a couple of hours, indicating the approach of a severe storm, probably high and varying winds and a cold snap.

Gardiner Election.—Capt. N. J. Cornwall of the tug Gleaner came down from Gardiner yesterday. He states that Gardiner will have a special election February 6 to vote on the question of incorporating the town.

Jay Mahoney's Plan.—C. J. Mahoney, an attorney of Portland, spent several days in Florence this week, looking over the situation with a view of locating here to practice law. He left yesterday by the beach route toward the north on his way back to Portland.—Florence West.

The first scow load of lumber arrived and men immediately started laying it. The work will be rushed to completion by Perkins and Jenkins who have the contract.
