SAYS ROAD IS IN GOOD SHAPE

Tom Coke Says That This End of Old Coos Bay Wagon Road is Fine.

That this end of the old Coos Bay wagon road is in excellent condition for winter and is even now in better condition than it formerly was during the summer months is the opinion of Tom Coke who has just returned from a trip to Dora. As Mr. Coke drove stage on the road for a long time, a number of years ago, he is probably better able to judge the road than any one else.

"I was surprised to find the road in such good condition," said Mr. Coke today. "Four of us accompanied the body of Capt. Wilcox to Dora. We drove slowly with the corpse but covered the fourteen miles in four hours.

The same team came in from Dora to meet us and made the trip in just three hours. This made seven hours that the team required to cover the twenty-eight miles, or an average of four miles per hour. Other rigs made the trip much faster. I remember that in the summer months, Jack Carter and I once drove from Roseburg to Coos City, a distance of sixty-two miles, in twelve hours. This was a record-breaking trip and was the subject of much discussion. People who are kicking about the condition of the road, or at any rate about this end of it, are doing so without any good reason."
