OVER 1,000 FAVOR CHANGE

Over one thousand signatures have so far been secured to the petitions asking that the location of the Coos Bay Life Saving Station be changed forward to the officials of the Department.

D. R. McCormac, as president of the Chamber of Commerce, has sent the following letter to the Superintendent of the United States Life Saving Service at Washington, D. C., relative to the matter:

The recent disaster on Coos Bay bar, which caused the loss of six lives and left three widows with fourteen fatherless children, has again called attention to the need of a change in the location of the Life Saving Station at this place.

Much of the criticism that has been directed toward the efficiency of the service of Coos Bay has been caused by events that might have been prevented had the station been located where prompt service could have been rendered to those in danger.

With an increasing commerce which furnishes a steady daily procession of freight and passenger vessels in and out of this harbor, several thousand lives each year are placed in jeopardy in case of accident by reason of the present location of the Life Saving Station.

On Coos Bay there are over three hundred motor boats, nearly all of which during some time of the year run down to the entrance to the harbor, two miles below the location of the Life Saving Station, and should any accident happen on the ebb tide they are carried out to sea before the crew can rescue them.

Many accidents happen every year in this locality, in which the rescues have been performed before the Life Saving crew could arrive.

Please refer to report on the wreck of the schooner Marconi, a vessel loaded with lumber bound for Chilli, which was wrecked on the bar, drifted over the South Spit into Bastendorf Cove, where by means of lines from the overhanging cliffs, the crew were rescued by Captain B. W. Olson and a couple of the crew of the steamer Nann Smith before the Life Saving crew arrived.

Many instances could be given where small boats have been in trouble that would have resulted in loss of life had there not been other aid to hand than that furnished by the distant Life Saving crew.

It is not the purpose of this letter to criticize the work of the crew at this time, but rather to show that with present conditions they are so handicapped that they are liable at any time to be blamed for results that they cannot prevent.

During the summer time the beach at Charleston is a resort for bathers and at times several hundred are gathered there with all the possibilities of accidents attending such resorts, and the station should be located there so that the crew could give prompt assistance in case of trouble.

Under separate cover I am mailing you petitions and other data in relation to this subject, which I hope will receive your careful consideration, and that you will take prompt steps to remedy this alarming defect in the service at this port.
