Cabbage Salad

Select a well-shaped, crisp head of cabbage. Remove the coarse outer leaves, take out the heart of the cabbage and cut the edges into points. Chop the removed cabbage finely. Season with salt, pepper and equal measures of salted whipped cream and mayonnaise dressing and mix together thoroughly. Fill the open space in the cabbage with this mixture and decorate with finely chopped beets garnished with parsley.
