Capt. Britt of the Coos Bay Life Saving Station was in Marshfield today on business. He says that he is hopeful that the Department will comply with the petition for the removal of the station to a site at Charleston or near Coos Head. He says that he has recommended it in the past and that the last time Inspector Quinan was here, he went over the situation fully with him and showed him the reasons for urging the change.

Capt. Britt feels grieved over the many rumors that were circulated concerning the life saving crew in connection with the Launch North Star disaster and the criticism that some of these reports have brought upon his men. He characterized these reports as being absolutely without foundation and declares that the only reason why his men could not do more effective work was the distance of the life saving station from the scene of the accident. Owing to the belief that the North Star would be washed in on the south spit, Mr. Nordstrom of the crew first had the oar boat launched but Capt. Britt reached there then and ordered the power boat taken because he felt sure the strong ebb tide would carry the North Star seaward. This change meant a loss of less than five minutes.

Capt. Britt says he is sure the men must have jumped from the North Star. When they first got near the launch after the accident, she was up on the jetty, right side up and her cabin not even damaged.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT.
