BARROW ALSO GIVES VIEWS

Editor Coos Bay Times:

In your issue of the 26th inst. I notice an article by one Rev. G. Le Roy Hall, criticising our Sheriff for lax custody of persons in his charge, and intimating that he was showing partiality in his treatment of these persons. It is evident that the Rev. Gentleman did not inform himself before penning his criticism.

In the first instance the gentleman should know that there is a vast difference between the case of a man merely "bound over" to the grand jury and one already convicted of an offense. The man confined in jail is not merely charged with violating the fruit law, he has been convicted and is serving out his sentence in jail of his own volition. He had the option of paying a \$50 fine or laying it out in jail, and he chose the latter. Goldie Bestcott and W. R. Foote have not so much as been indicted yet, much less convicted.

In the second place, everybody in Coos County, except the Rev. Gentleman knows that we have no woman's ward in the jail, and the Sheriff must of necessity lock Miss Bestcott in the jail with seven or eight men, or else keep her outside in charge of an officer. Great percentive head has the Rev. Gentleman that he did not discover this fact. At night she is locked up in the padded steel cell for the insane, the only possible place the Sheriff has to put her under lock and key. Instead of criticising our worthy Sheriff, the Rev. Gentleman had better criticise us taxpayers for not furnishing a ward for women.

As for W. R. Foote, he is seriously afflicted with chronic ailments of the heart, lungs and throat that make close confinement dangerous to his life, as is shown by the affidavit and certificate of an able physician. In fact he could not be kept in close confinement and live. He is locked up most of the time and is at all times in charge of a special officer.

Finally, I online that our very able Sheriff knows so well how to safeguard prisoners, that he needs no instructions from the Rev. Gentleman. And he is certainly too well known to be injured by such unjust criticism.
