Kansas Man, Using Four Mules and Road Scraper, Starts Out to

Build Railroad. By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

GARDEN CITY, Kan., Feb. 2 .- If Rudolph Myers, who is now 50 years old, lives ten or fifteen years longer neck. and remains firm in his determination to build a railroad all by himself, the people of Garden City may hear the toot of a locomotive on the only railway in the world constructed by one-man power.

Myers has already started his "system" and has graded four miles of roadbed out of Jetmore, 53 miles northeast of Garden City.
