**WHY NOT TRY THIS PLAN ON ROSEBURG-COOS LINE?**

**Kansas Man, Using Four Mules and Road Scraper, Starts Out to Build Railroad.**

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

GARDEN CITY, Kan., Feb. 2.—If Rudolph Myers, who is now 50 years old, lives ten or fifteen years longer and remains firm in his determination to build a railroad all by himself, the people of Garden City may hear the toot of a locomotive on the only railway in the world constructed by one-man power.

Myers has already started his "system" and has graded four miles of roadbed out of Jetmore, 53 miles northeast of Garden City. He expects to bring his road ten miles nearer Garden City, the projected terminus, within the next year, with his own labor and money. In the 4 mi. already completed he has done all the labor with the aid only of four mules hitched to a road scraper. He says little about his ambitious project, and it is only known that he intends to construct his line from Jetmore, which is on a branch of the Santa Fe system, to this city, which is on the main line. Offers of financial assistance and labor have been spurned by Myers. He began acquiring the right of way about three years ago, paying cash for the land. Some people consider Myers a "little off," but the wiser ones think him a Napoleon of finance and believe that his right of way will become highly valuable, since it traverses a route where a railroad is much needed and over which a line will certainly be built sooner or later.
