Work Commenced—Work of driving piling on the road between Marshfield and North Bend was commenced yesterday.

Proves On Homestead—W. H. Stull was in today from his ranch above Allegany, making final proof on his homestead before Commissioner A. K. Peck.

Is Improving—W. S. Chandler was reported a little better today. A professional nurse is now assisting Mrs. Chandler in caring for him at their apartments in the Coke building.

Leases Cafe—R. F. Smith, who formerly operated the Palace Car restaurant, has leased the Coos Restaurant in No. Front street, taking possession yesterday.

New Bandon Store—D. M. Averill is here from Eureka with about one hundred tons of fixtures and stock for a new dry goods store which he will open at Bandon.

Injured In Mill—Nels Olson of Eastside was quite badly injured yesterday at the C. A. Smith mill by being caught in the conveyor. His leg was badly bruised and some bones in his foot crushed.

Mass Later—Mass will be celebrated at the Marshfield Catholic Church tomorrow at 10:30 instead of 10 o'clock by Rev. Father Springer. Rev. Father Munro is expected home from his California trip on the next Nann Smith.

New Class—The confirmation class in the Lutheran Church met for the first time this year today. Rev. Bengtson is in charge of the class, which will meet every Saturday at 10 a. m. in the church hereafter.

Ranch Not Sold—Ben Tyrer of Cooston was a Marshfield business visitor today. The report that he had sold part of his ranch was not correct. He is figuring on selling the property but has not closed any deal for it yet.

Name Traver—At a meeting of the Marshfield Fire Department Thursday, L. W. Traver was elected secretary to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Louis Keating, who was compelled to retire owing to his being transferred to Portland.

Get New Machine—A Wilcox has purchased and brought to Marshfield a first class, up-to-date Pop Corn wagon, the first one in this part of Oregon. It is a real acquisition and will become a conspicuous addition to the outward appearance and equipment of the street life of our city.

Horse Falls—A horse belonging to Levi Heisner slipped and fell at the corner of Broadway and Central avenue today. The rider was slightly

stunned by the fall and his leg bruised but his injuries were not serious.

Meet Monday—The annual meetings of the Coos County Fire Patrol Association and the Coos County Tax Association will be held in the office of the secretary, W. J. Conrad, next Monday afternoon and it is expected that representatives of all the big timber holders in the county will be present.

Buy Fine Animal—O. N. Wilson and Mike Boone, of Sumner, today received a fine registered yearling bull which they recently purchased from R. A. Landrith's dairy and stock ranch on Coos River. Messrs. Wilson and Boone are in the dairy business and find that blooded stock pays every time.

Award Contract—The Coos County Commissioners have awarded Herman Larson the contract for dredging Larson Inlet. The cost will be about \$4,125, one half of which will be borne by the county and the other half paid by the property owners of that vicinity. The work is to be done inside of six months.

Father Dead—Mrs. E. H. Fish today received news of the death of her father, J. W. Albert, at his home in Fair Oaks, Cal. Death has apparently resulted from complications incident to his advanced age. Though full particulars are not known, Mrs. Fish had been planning to visit her parents in about a month and the sad news comes as a terrible shock to her.

Postpone Play—Owing to Chauncey Clarke leaving today for Portland, the reproduction of the play "Frances Ward" which was planned for tonight has been indefinitely postponed. Mr. Scott left today for San Francisco to secure other members of the stock company which he and Mrs. Scott will have on the Coos County circuit.

Pipe Defective—Marshal Carter and D. Y. Stafford who made further investigation of the gas leak that for a time endangered the Sartor cany store, the Quatemass studio and adjoining places the night before last, found that a workman of the gas company had used an old piece of gas pipe in making the connection. The old pipe was split, allowing the gas to escape.

Plan Mill—N. A. Leach, manager of the Hume estate in Curry County, for the owners, the McClay estate of Portland, passed through here today en route to Portland to confer with the owners of the property relative to putting in a sawmill with a capacity of about 50,000 feet per day there. He was accompanied by Fred Caughell, who looks after the store for them and also by a Mr. Gadke, a millwright, who has been investigating the mill project.

Socialist Convention—A number of delegates from the Socialist Locals in this district left on this morning's train for Coquille, where they hold a joint convention today to discuss questions relating to the party propaganda in Coos County. The question of starting a newspaper to further the cause is one of the important matters under consideration. Among those going from Marshfield were John Hayden, P. B. Smith, A. J. Stephan, T. L. Cole, and Asher Wilson.

Buy Machinery—The Coos County Commissioners have purchased the engine, hoisting apparatus and boiler of McLain's rock crushing plant and will move it to the county stone quarry, near Coquille, where it will be utilized in furnishing crushed rock for road building purposes. Commissioners Dement and Armstrong returned to their homes yesterday, having completed the inspection of the proposed improvement of the Marshfield-North Bend road and also of the proposed dredging of Larson Inlet. They have not fully made up their minds as to what will be done on the latter project yet.

The Two Orphans—Kate Claxton—Personally supervised the staging of "The Two Orphans," a three reel subject to be shown at the Orpheum on next Friday afternoon and night. 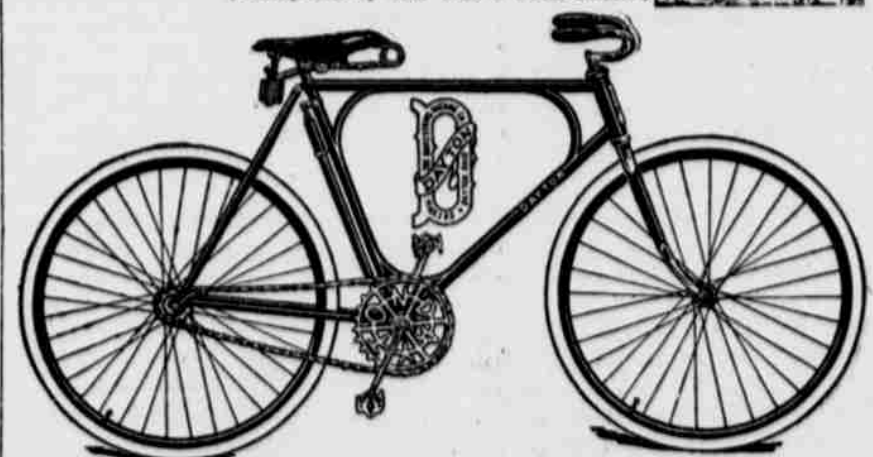
