United States Steel Corporation Forbidden to Destroy Business Records.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 6.—Judge Gray in the United States Court for the Third District today issued an injunction restraining the defendants in the government's trust suit against the United States Steel Corporation from destroying the books and papers desired by the government.

One portion of the government's petition seems susceptible of interpretation that criminal indictments and prosecutions of certain officers of the steel corporation and its subsidiaries are under consideration by the Department of Justice.
