BUY PROPERTY IN NORTH BEND

Southern Pacific Secures Right of Way to Connect With Terminal Railway.

Southern Pacific right of way agents are purchasing considerable right of way in North Bend. It is stated that they are buying from near the mouth of Pony Inlet along the survey recently run there to connect up with the proposed route of the Terminal Railway.

By some this is taken to be additional evidence that the company has again changed its mind and is now determined to bridge the Bay.

There have been rumors afloat that the Southern Pacific was planning to acquire an interest in or to lease the Terminal Railway. This morning it was stated by a party in a position to know that this was utterly without foundation.

Smith Company Plans.

There have been no developments in the negotiations between the C. A. Smith Company and the local line of the Southern Pacific relative to extensions for logging road purposes. C. A. Smith was to have taken the matter up with Messrs. Calvin and Mills in San Francisco last week. Mr. Calvin is president of the local line.

It is understood that there are two matters up between the companies. One is that the Southern Pacific make the extension to Bridge or somewhere in that vicinity and fix the rate on logs accordingly. The other is that the C. A. Smith Company build its own logging road and be given wheelage rights over the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern and then run its on trains direct to the mill.

New Bridge Rumor.

A new rumor about bridging the Bay was afloat here today. It was to the effect that the location of the proposed bridge had been changed and that it now is proposed to span the Bay just north of the mouth of Coos River to a point near the Standard Oil warehouse. Just who is sponsor for the story and how much reliance can be placed in it is something that could not be determined today.

McGOWAN STANDS PAT

Denies That He Admitted That He Perjured Himself

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 7. — Charles McGowan, of Regina, Canada, the Hines-Lorimer witness who according to private detectives admitted that he perjured himself in giving testimony in favor of Lorimer before the Senate investigation committee last summer, was called to the witness chair today and denied the truth of the allegations of the detectives.

McGowan, however, admitted that he had received \$300 from C. F. Wiebe, a brother-in-law of Edward Hines, for losses he sustained by absence from his business in Canada while he was before the committee in Washington last July.

COLD WEATHER IN EAST NOW

Wm. Ledward Receives Letter Telling of Auto Trip Across Lake Erie.

If any Coos Bayite thinks he has reason to complain about the weather, he had better look up an eastern paper or a friend who has just had a letter from the Middle West or East telling of conditions there. In many places in the Middle West, the railroads were blockaded for several days as a result of the blizzard.

A letter to Wm. Ledward, of this city, tells of a very interesting and decidedly chilly experience that befell several of his eastern friends. Last week the cold was so intense in Ohio and the Lake States that Lake Erie froze entirely and sleighing and skating parties were made up everywhere. A party of five started out on the hard ice one wintry day for an automobile trip. They travelled from Cleveland to Putin Bay, a distance of 150 miles, and back. The trip over was serene enough and the party had a delightful time on their novel ride, but the return was not so happy. A blinding snowstorm came up and swept over the lake, forming great drifts on the ice and utterly destroying the voyagers' sense of direction. As there was danger in blindly advancing over the ice in the car, it became necessary for first one and then another of the rapidly freezing party to walk before the machine to watch out for possible soft ice and to try to gain some idea of their location. After floundering about in the drifts for hours, keeping in motion only through fear of freezing to death, the party reached Cleveland again, thoroughly worn out by their successful attempt to be the first people to cross the Great Lakes in an automobile. If the cold increases in the same proportion as it has in the last two weeks there is a prediction on foot that even Lake Superior, the great freshwater ocean, will be entirely frozen over by the middle of this month.
