

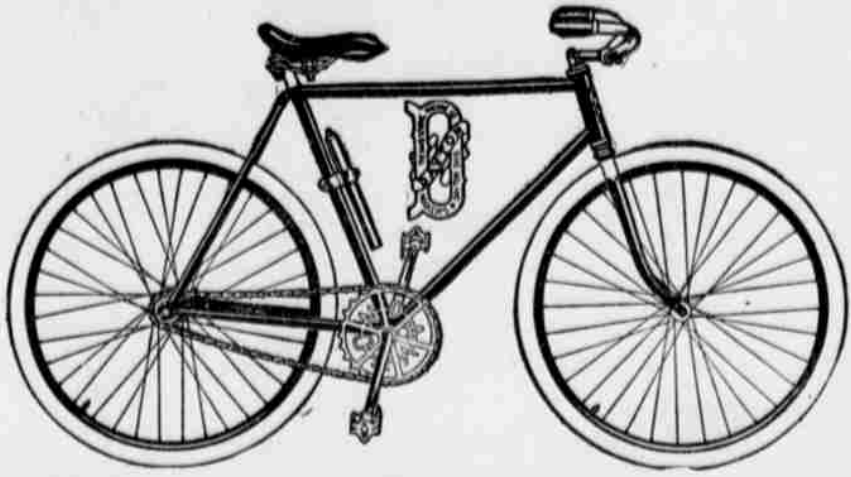

Quits Bandon Position—Miss Edna Wieder, who has been in charge of the local central office for some time, has resigned, and Mrs. Roby Tilton is now in charge. Miss Elsie Lewis has also accepted a position in the Central office.—Bandon Recorder.

Prepare for Fill—A gang of men working in connection with the dredging operations today started to lay the pipe preparatory to filling Broadway South and Anderson avenue. Another large gang of men is finishing the bulkheading of Anderson avenue and adjoining properties.

Argue Case—Judge Coke today is hearing oral arguments on the motions in the election contest case between R. A. Copple and E. E. Straw over the Marshfield mayoralty. The legal fight so far has been over technicalities raised by Mayor Straw's attorneys.

Cement is Cheaper—F. S. Dow yesterday received word of a decline of 25 cents per barrel in the price of cement. This will materially affect the cost of building and paving. The cause of the reduction was not stated nor is it known how long the reduced price will obtain.

Was Injured—According to a report here, Mrs. J. V. Smeaton, formerly of Marshfield, was quite severely injured by the explosion of an oil stove at their home in Oakland last week.

In falling one of the trees it split and a portion struck Malls on the leg, inflicting slight injuries that will lay him up for a few days. It was a mere chance that he escaped the heavier section which would have resulted in much more serious injuries.

Flynn Coming—As she is having her boilers retubed, the steamer Breakwater, Captain Macgenn, will not sail until Wednesday night for Coos Bay. Among the passengers will be Dennis Flynn, of Oklahoma, and Cassius H. Peck, an attorney of Marshfield.
