LONDON, Feb. 10-Ernest Terah Hooley, who was one of the leading men in the financial world of London a few years ago, was senienced today to a year's imprisonment on the charge of obtaining money by fraudulently representing as free from encumbrance some property he had sold to the complainant. Hooley was one of the leading financiers of England from 1890 to 1898, when he was declared bankrupt. He had been regarded as one of the wealthlest men in the country, aquiring riches through the promotion of numerous companies. He was supposed to have made a profit of \$12,500,000 in a rubber tire deal in 1896.

War Department Holds Troops In Readiness to Proceed There Quickly. By Associated Press to the Coos Bay

Times.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—The Eighteenth Infantry has been orderel from Whipple Barracks, Ariz., to El Pasc, Texas. The situation in Juarez, opposite El Paso, is reported ugly. The insurgents are much disturbed by the threatened entry of the Madero troops into that place by

way of American territory. The withdrawal of permission of Mexican troops to proceed over American territory amounts only to a delay until a complete understand-ing is reached. When at first the request of the Mexican government was granted by the State Department, it was understood that only 400 men were involved for garrisoning the post at Juarez.

Later much uneasiness was expressed by Texans who feared Mexico would use the American route for a general mobilization of troops to-suppress outbreaks in Chihuahua. Upon representations from Governor Colquitt of Texas the first permission was held up.

Discussion is now progressing between the two countries to make it clear that the American government. be granted permission only for a small garrison to go to Juarez.

When the understanding is clear. the soldiers undoubtedly will pass under escort of American cavalry. The War Department, it is said, has not in contemplation of sending

any other troops toward the border at present, but they still are in readiness. CAN'T CROSS BORDER.
