The members of the senior class in American history will be given subjects shortly on which to write these.

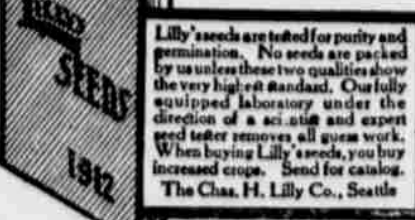
The Roman history class have been studying the legends of the institutions of the Romans.
