LABOR UNION OFFICIALS AND MEN ARRESTED FOR DYNAMITING

Forty-six Taken Into Custody on Indictments Returned at Indianapolis.

ARRESTS MADE IN OVER SCORE OF CITIES

Most Sweeping Federal Prosecution of Kind Ever Attempted is Started.

Mrs. Della Totten, Convicted of Murdering Washington Rancher, in Asylum.

CLAIM THAT SHE IS IN INCURABLE CONDITION

Mother, Aged 75, Granted New Trial, But May Never Be Tried Again.

WENATCHEE, Wash., Feb. 14.—Mrs. Della Totten, whose sentence for life in the Walla Walla penitentiary for killing James Sutton, near Cashmere, two years ago, was recently upheld by the Supreme Court, has become insane and is confined in the Medical Lake asylum.

Mrs. Totten's mother, Mrs. Beebe, tried as an accomplice and granted a new trial, may never be tried again as she is now nearly 75 years old.

NEW ELECTION IN NORTH BEND

Voters to Pass on Proposed Charter Amendments There April 16.

The North Bend City Council at a meeting last evening made preliminary arrangements for a special election to be held there April 16 when a number of charter amendments to comply with the terms of the franchise desired by the Terminal Railway will be submitted to the voters for their approval.

Besides these amendments, which are practically the same as submitted last fall, some other amendments are proposed relative to the indebtedness of the city.
