Perhaps Lincoln's greatest utterance, and it is one of the masterpleces of English literature, was his address at Gettysburg, November 19, 1863, which Pillows:

Fourscore and seven years ago our fathers brought forth upon this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation or any nation, so conceived and so delicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that We have come to dedicate a great portion of that field as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate-we cannot consecrate-we cannot hallow-this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our power to add to or detract. The world will little note nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they have thus far so nobly carried on. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to this task remaining before usthat from these honored dead we than by deserving it. take increased devotion to that cause measure of devotion; that we here not have died in vain; that this na-tion, under God, shall have a the truthful advertiser from the blattion, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom; and that this government of the people, by the people and for the people, shall not perish
