**WEALTHY TIMBERMAN DIES**

**William Carson Felled First Redwood Ever Cut for Lumber.**  
 EUREKA, Cal., Feb. 22—William Carson, the multi-millionaire lumberman who came to Humboldt County in 1852 and felled the first redwood ever cut for lumber, died at his home here, aged 87. Death was caused by diseases incident to old age. Carson leaves a fortune variously estimated at from \$15,000,000 to \$40,000,000. He was born in New Brunswick and leaves a son, William Carson, Jr., and a daughter, Mrs. R. J. Tyson, in San Francisco, and two sons, J. Milton Carson and Sumner Carson, here.

**BRING SIXTY MEN TO BAY**

**Chamber of Commerce to Arrange for Homes for Many New Families Coming.**

That sixty shipbuilders will shortly arrive on the Bay to take positions here and that probably at least thirty of them will be accompanied by families was the report made at a special meeting of the committee on the location of new enterprises at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce yesterday. Furthermore, according to word from Kruse & Banks, who are bringing the men here, it is doubtful if thirty houses can be secured. The committee decided to take steps immediately to try and provide for homes for the new people. The men are being brought here to work on the several new vessels which are to be constructed at the shipyards this summer.

The committee also received a proposition from a Portland firm which is desirous of locating a plant here for the manufacture of cement bricks or blocks. The committee will try and assist them. Among other matters taken were propositions from different companies that are desirous of coming here and opening up new additions on which they will erect houses to sell on the installment plan. As in addition to erecting the houses, the firms would improve and beautify the new additions, an effort will be made to further interest them on the Bay.

Those present at the committee meeting were Chairman D. C. Green, M. C. Horton, I. S. Kaufman and A. W. Myers.

**TRIBBLE GETS BIG CONTRACT.**

**Is Awarded \$300,000 Job in Yakima Valley, Washington.**  
 W. L. Tribble, the Spokane railroad contractor who visited Coos Bay a few times last summer supposedly in connection with bids on the construction of the Coos Bay and Boise railroad and a brother of W. Ed. Tribble, who makes his headquarters in Marshfield, has been awarded a big contract in Washington. Concerning it, the Spokane Spokesman-Review says:

"W. L. Tribble, a Spokane railroad contractor, was awarded a contract by the Yakima Valley Transportation Company for the construction of six miles of a new extension line of the company which will cost approximately \$300,000 and will give the company entrance into the Selah Valley, near North Yakima. N. C. Richards, president of the company, and F. L. Pitman, chief engineer, awarded the contract, after conferring with Robert E. Strahorn in this city.

"Mr. Tribble has handled much of the important work on the new Spokane-Portland short line of the O.-W. R. & N., of which the Yakima Valley Transportation Company is a subsidiary company. This included work in the Palouse canyon and along the Palouse river. He will commence work on the new extension in the North Yakima country at once so the line will be in readiness to handle the crops of the present year."
