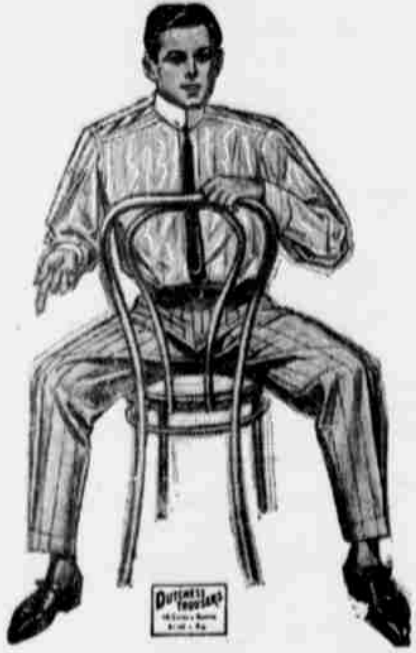

Receives Insurance—Mrs. Emil Ogren received a check for \$2000 this morning from the Modern Woodmen, in payment of the policy carried by her late husband.

Council Tonight—The Marshfield city council will meet this evening to take up the matter of calling a special election to dispose of the water works matter.

Rainfall to Date—The total rainfall on Coos Bay since September 1, 1911, is 43.21 inches, according to the official record kept by B. B. Ostlund, government observer.

Improve Ranch—R. C. Cordez is making some extensive improvements in his sand hill ranch, erecting a new barn and other buildings. He plans to raise a large number of ducks on the place.

Fire Damage—J. W. Riggs has received a letter from his son, H. Riggs, who is a dentist at Grangeville, Idaho, stating that a recent fire there did much damage and has seriously affected the prosperity of the town.

Damage Slight—W. F. Miller states that the reports of the damage to his auto in the recent mishap with it were overdrawn. He says the only damage was a bent spring and the cost of repairs will be only a few dollars.

No More Oil—C. M. Maupin states that he had another telephone message last evening from Bandon stating that they had not yet drilled out the sand "plug" in the Bear creek oil well and that there were no developments in the oil strike.

More Petitions—William Grimes is circulating the petition here of Ben Selling of Portland, who is seeking the Republican nomination for United States senator. Sheriff W. W. Gage is also preparing to start the circulation of his nominating petitions for sheriff on the Democratic ticket.

Will Preach Here—Rt. Rev. L. C. Foss, president of Pacific district of the Norwegian Lutheran Synod, will preach in the Norwegian church hall in Marshfield Thursday evening at 8 o'clock, and in the Swedish Lutheran church in North Bend Friday evening at 8 o'clock. Rev. And. G. Lind is pastor of the local church.

Build New Walk—Arrangements are being made for the construction of a new cement walk around the Chandler hotel. The present walk is sloping and badly cracked as a result of the ground underneath it settling. Manager McKeown is also arranging to have the Central avenue entrance to the hotel improved when the walk is completed.

Old Suit Up—Another phase of the old suit of Levi Heisner vs. Bucher, involving a bill of about \$40 for hauling Bucher's family to Curry county, is being tried in Justice Pennock's court this afternoon. Now the case has developed into a controversy between Heisner and Cameron as to whom the money belongs. Constable Cox holds the money.

Launch Boat—Dr. R. H. Walter launched his new gasoline boat the "Get-There and Get-Back" this morning. It is a trim built craft 35 feet long with an eight-foot beam, and Doc says it will be found true to its name at all times. D. A. Jones and Gordon Smith assisted in the launching, Dave breaking a bottle of gasoline on the prow as he christened her.

Install Officers—The Marshfield lodge of the Loyal Order of Moose held its annual installation of officers last evening. It was to have taken place several weeks ago, but had to be postponed on account of the absence of some of the officers. There were no special ceremonies, but there was a large attendance, many coming from North Bend.

Want Postoffice—Milton Lattin of South Inlet has forwarded a petition containing 133 names to the post-office department at Washington asking that a postoffice be established at South Inlet. Mrs. Del Saunders is the applicant for appointment as postmistress. They ask for twice a week mail service from Empire. The Saunders place is about four miles up South Inlet from the drawbridge. The office would serve practically all

the residents of South Inlet who are now dependent on the free service furnished by the Smith-Powers Logging Company and the Younker launch Vega.

Rent New Store Room—Going & Harvey have found it necessary to secure additional store room and today completed negotiations for the lease of the lower floor of the Flanagan building, formerly occupied by the Coast Mall and opposite their present store. The additional quarters were required for their increasing stock and to provide for an enlarged business when the railway development commences. The new store room will give them about 3000 additional square feet of floor space.

Contractor Here—Contractor Johnson of the firm of Johnson & Anderson, who have the contract for the Sluslaw Jetty, was on Coos Bay this week arranging for the shipment of a cargo of powder on the tug Roberts from here to Florence. He says that the Southern Pacific is now taking options on the right of way between Florence and the Umpqua. He is quoted as saying that the Impression at Florence is that the Southern Pacific has taken over the Sumner project and that there will be only one road from Eugene to Coos Bay.

# WILL DREDGE SLIP AT MILL

Oregon to Be Moved March 5 to Do Special Work to Load Bessie Dollar.

The dredge Oregon, which is now working on the channel project near Porter, will move March 5 to the C. A. Smith mill to dredge out the slip there so that everything will be in readiness for loading the Bessie Dollar, the big lumber schooner which is to take on a cargo of about 3,500,000 feet of lumber here next month for China.

Major Morrow has just approved of a request from the C. A. Smith company to have the channel at the mill dock dredged out to a depth of 22 feet, 600 feet long and 80 feet wide, and has notified Engineer Leefe to have the work done at once. Mr. Leefe figures it will require probably two days dredging. The C. A. Smith company will pay the expense of the work.

The new casting for the Oregon will reach here March 7, according to present advices, or about the time the dredging of the slip at the Smith mill will be completed. It will be put on immediately and the Oregon will then resume the channel work in front of Marshfield and start the fill near the Masonic opera house.

Bids on the new bar dredge for Coos Bay will be opened February 29. Bids on this were called for once before, but were rejected on account of all of them being too high.

The Bessie Dollar is expected here about March 12. The Coos Bay bar, which has been shoaling some recently, will probably be scoured off by that time, so that there will be no difficulty in bringing her in or taking her out with the big cargo.

### ALONG THE WATER FRONT.

The Lily will shortly complete taking on a cargo of 200,000 feet of lumber from the Coquille Mill and Mercantile Company at the railroad docks for San Francisco.

The steamer Washington is taking on a cargo of about 500,000 feet of lumber at the railroad dock from the Coquille Mill and Mercantile Company and another Coquille mill at the railroad docks. She will sail Friday. The lumber is destined for San Pedro.

The Breakwater is due in early tomorrow from Portland. She will probably go on dry dock at Portland in a month or six weeks for her annual overhauling, which Captain Macgenn expects will require only a short time.

When the bar tug Tatoosh came inside Saturday night, from a cruise off the mouth of the river, it was found that her master, Captain E. D. Parsons, had been taken suddenly ill and had to be taken to a hospital. Sunday afternoon a report came from Astoria that his attending physician pronounced that he was suffering with an attack of pneumonia and that his condition was serious.

### NEW TUNNEL MACHINERY.

Twohy Bros. Plan to Rush Work Near Eugene.

The Eugene Guard says: "When the bench in the tunnel on the new Coos Bay railroad has reached 120 feet, Twohy Bros. expect to install machinery, if there is no change in the formation which will prevent its operation. The tunnel is now about 100 feet under ground and the 120-foot mark will be reached late this week. Up to the present time the character of the formation has prevented the use of machinery. The big steam shovel is on the ground, but the crumbling of the walls prevented its being put to work. In order to operate this shovel the erection of a compressing plant will be necessary. The machinery for this has not yet been shipped from Portland, but will be as soon as it is certain that the shovel can be used. In case that it cannot be used, some other sort of machinery will be installed."
