ROOSEVELT MAKES TART REPLY TO SEC. STIMSON'S SPEECH

President Says That it is Only Partly True He Was Forced to Run.

SAME REASON WHY HE SUPPORTED STIMSON
Stimson in Chicago Address Urged Renomination of Taft by Republicans.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)
MINEOLA, Long Island, March 6.—Secretary Stimson's speech in Chicago last night supporting Taft for the Republican nomination brought from Col. Roosevelt today the following tart reply:
"In regard to Stimson's statement that it is against my original intention and that I am being forced by certain persons into the arena this year, I need merely say that the statement is correct, only in the sense that it would be correct to make the same statement as to the advocacy of Stimson for governor in 1910. In that contest, as in this, I was exceedingly reluctant to be drawn into the contest. In that contest, as in this, I acted only from a sense of duty to the people as a whole and in that contest I was assailed precisely by the same arguments and by a great majority of those who are now assailing me."
After spending several hours in the court house the jurors were exhausted and Roosevelt departed for Oyster Bay.

NO CHANGE IN MAIL SERVICE

Congressman Hawley Says it Will Not be Put Back on Myrtle Point Route.

There is little likelihood of the Coos Bay mail service being changed from the old Coos Bay wagon road to the Myrtle Point route again, according to a telegram from Congressman Hawley. Owing to Contractor Barnard intimating that the department might order the change on account of his claims that the old Coos Bay wagon road was not being kept in good condition and the fact that he had made a complaint to the department about the condition of the road, some here thought there was a possibility of it being done.
Dr. McCormac, president of the Chamber of Commerce, immediately took the matter up by wire with Congressman Hawley, stating that everyone on Coos Bay was opposed to such a change. In response to this telegram, Congressman Hawley has wired him as follows:
"Postoffice Department advises me that no change in mail route from Coos Bay to Myrtle Point is contemplated and that in event of a petition for the same your statements will be given consideration."

KING GUILTY OF CRUELTY

Jury in Justice Shuster's Court at North Bend Acts Quick—Sentence Saturday.

Geo. W. King, proprietor of the Empire Meat Market in Marshfield, last night was found guilty of cruelty to animals by a jury in Justice Shuster's court in North Bend. The hearing, which began yesterday afternoon, lasted until about midnight, when the jury brought in a verdict of guilty.
Justice Shuster announced last evening that sentence would be pronounced this morning, but today he deferred passing sentence until Saturday morning.

NEW SERVICE TO COOS BAY

W. S. Scammell, Manager of Coos Bay and Eureka Steamship Co., Coming.

W. S. Scammell, manager of the Coos Bay and Eureka Steamship Company, is expected here the last of this week or ten days on the Bay. It is understood that the object of his visit is to arrange a new schedule for the ships of his line, one which will give Coos county better service than she now has.
The company now operates the steamers Washington and Homer. The Washington will leave San Francisco for here Friday and the Homer, which has just returned from an Alaskan trip, will sail from San Francisco for Coos Bay next Monday.

The company is also figuring on buying or chartering a number of other vessels, among them the M. F. Plant, which was formerly on the Coos Bay-San Francisco run and which was recently overhauled and equipped with more power. If the company gets the Plant it is understood that they may put her on the Coos Bay-San Francisco run again.
This will probably be determined by the time that Mr. Scammell completes his visit on the Bay.

Plan New Dock.
The Reynolds Development Company, which took over the O. C. & N. property here, including the Ocean dock and the water front just north of it, is said to be figuring on the construction of a new dock and possibly a new warehouse on the vacant property just south of the Standard Oil warehouse. So far, the matter has not reached a definite stage, but probably will in the near future.

KILLED IN SEATTLE.
Unknown Youth Blamed for Motorcyclist's Death.

SEATTLE, March 6.—Harold Gibbons, aged twenty, a chauffeur, was killed today when a motorcycle he was riding was struck by the automobile of Fier Chief Stetson. An unknown youth was riding behind Gibbons and when it seemed likely the vehicles would collide he jumped from his motorcycle. His act confused Gibbons so that he was unable to avoid the motor car.

MITCHELL IS TO STAND PAT

Labor Leader Refuses to Make Concession Requested by Judge Wright.

WASHINGTON, March 6.—John Mitchell, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor, declined today to give Judge Wright of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia any assurance that he expected "hereafter to lend adherence to decree of judicial tribunals of the land," to do so, Mitchell declared, would be an admission that he had heretofore failed to comply with lawful decrees. Mitchell said he had rather be convicted of contempt than be acquitted on any other ground than the facts in the case.

TEXAS FEUD AGAIN FATAL

John T. Sneed Killed at Georgetown, Tex., and Assassin Suicides.

GEORGETOWN, Texas, March 6.—John T. Sneed was killed today by one of his tenants, R. O. Hilliard. The assassin then killed himself. He said he shot for revenge.
John T. Sneed was the father of Jean Beal Sneed. The latter recently was on trial for killing Captain A. G. Boyce. The first tragedy was a sequel to the elopement of Captain Boyce's son with Sneed's wife. It is thought today's killing was the direct outgrowth of the Boyce-Sneed feud. The second trial was not decisive, the jury having failed to agree.

BANDON HOPES FOR RAILWAY

Think That Southern Pacific has Man Looking Over the Field.

Col. R. H. Rosa of Bandon, accompanied by Donald MacIntosh, who recently came to Bandon and organized a development company there are Marshfield visitors today. Mr. MacIntosh is gathering statistics on the shipping and products of this section.
Some have claimed that he is interested in some new railway project but Col. Rosa said that he was not aware of such being the case. It has been reported that the Southern Pacific was arranging for a line into Bandon to be operated in conjunction with the Coos Bay and Eugene line when the latter is completed and some have intimated that Mr. MacIntosh was at Bandon in the interests of the Harriman line.
Col. Rosa said that although they have not struck oil in the Bear Creek well, they have found strong indications of it and are hoping to get the real thing soon. The well is now down about 2400 feet. The Bandon company behind it is running a little short of funds and Col. Rosa is urging that some of the parties who have subscribed towards sinking a well on Coos Bay assist them financially in order that a complete test that if oil is found there it will insure oil being found near Coos Bay, but that if it is not there is little likelihood of it being found here, the geological formation at Bandon and on Coos Bay being practically the same.

SEND MORE TROOPS.

LA FOLLETTE IS STILL IN GAME

Wisconsin Man Has No Intention of Leaving Field to Taft and Roosevelt.

WASHINGTON, March 6.—La Follette has no intention of abandoning the field to the Taft and Roosevelt supporters it is said although he at present is taking no active part in the campaign. Similar fights will be made in Nebraska, South Dakota, Oregon, New Jersey, Wisconsin and North Dakota.

BATTLESHIP IS ALMOST SUNK

New Hampshire Almost Lost as Result of Sea-Valve Being Tampered With.

NEW YORK, March 6.—That the battleship New Hampshire narrowly escaped sinking in the Brooklyn navy yard Monday has just leaked out through unofficial sources. The battleship was about to be towed out of drydock. When the big dock flooded, three tugs made fast to the battleship and started to pull her out, when one of the blue jackets discovered a sea valve lid had been broken and water was pouring into her in a great volume. She was quickly replaced in the dock and the water pumped out. How the valve was misplaced will probably be the subject of an inquiry. There is suspicion that it was tampered with.

MORE TROOPS GO TO CHINA

United States Minister Calhoun Calls for Additional Force From Manila.

WASHINGTON, March 6.—American Minister Calhoun has called on Major General Bell at Manila for more American troops for service in China. General Bell has informed the War Department and it is expected that he will dispatch the remaining battalion of the Fifteenth Infantry, numbering seven hundred men, to Tien Tsin at once.

PATROL TIEN TSIN.

TIEN TSIN, March 6.—Commanders of the foreign detachments stationed here have an elaborate scheme for joint patrolling of the city. Such a measure was found necessary. The Chinese authorities, it is reported, have requested the immediate dispatch of Chinese troops to Tien Tsin to maintain order. It is regarded as certain that the foreign commanders will not allow the Chinese reinforcements to come within seven miles of Tien Tsin.

MORE TROOPS SENT.

MANILA, March 6.—In response to a request of United States Minister Calhoun at Pekin, Major General J. Franklin Bell commanding the Philippine division, is sending another battalion of the Fifteenth Infantry to North China.

Fifty Arrested at Managua for Alleged Threats of Dynamiting There.

FIRST INDICATION OF REPORTED HOSTILITY

All Quiet Following Jailing of Alleged Anti-American Inciters.

MANAGUA, Nicaragua, March 6.—An extraordinary outburst of anti-American feeling led to the arrest last night of fifty ring leaders who are being held in detention until Secretary Knox has departed. This is the first indication of the publicly expressed opposition to the Central American trip of Secretary Knox.
The persons arrested include the entire editorial staffs of the Diario De Nicaragua and Diario Moderno, which had published several letters and placed head lines over them suggesting that dynamite be used against Knox. All dispatches leaving the city are subjected to keen censorship. Official visits were made and receptions were held today. The friendliest feeling appears to prevail among the crowds on the streets.

BELIEU GONE; SUITS START

Marshfield Barber Leaves Trail of Woe Behind Him—In Vancouver Now.

The sudden departure of B. E. Belieu, a well known Marshfield barber and formerly a bartender here, has resulted in some legal complications that have finally reached Justice Penneck's court. Belieu left a number of creditors besides his wife to mourn his departure.
Yesterday afternoon his interest in the Golden Oak barber shop on Front street was attached by E. H. Joehnk to secure claims of about \$165 against Belieu. The shop was closed temporarily, but Messrs. Hunter and Clarey, who were associated with Belieu soon straightened this out and this afternoon are arranging so that they will be no longer harassed on his account.
Belieu left here about February 18. Mrs. Belieu says there is another woman in the case. It is believed that he is now at Vancouver, Wash. Mrs. Belieu has engaged an attorney to look after her interests and what action she will take remains to be seen. She declares that Belieu pawned her diamonds and she is now arranging to try and recover them.
Mr. and Mrs. Belieu have been conducting a rooming house in Marshfield.

SCOTT FINDS SOUTH POLE

London Paper Prints Rumor That Antarctic Explorer Has Reached Goal.

LONDON, March 6.—A rumor printed in an evening paper says Captain Robert F. Scott, the British Antarctic explorer, has reached the south pole. There is no confirmation from any source.
