Is Candidate—F. K. Gettings is circulating nominating petitions as a candidate for the republican nomination for state senator from Coos and Curry Counties. Whether Senator Chase of Coquille will be a candidate again has not been announced.

Buy New Home—Jas. Bennett and wife who recently sold their home property on Golden avenue to William Hyden, have bought the Copple property on South Fourth street. The family is already comfortably established in their new home.

Meeting Postponed—The special meeting called to be held at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce this evening to discuss the proposition to close Mill Slough has been postponed a few weeks owing to everything not being in readiness for it.

Father Ailing—R. M. Rau, a liquor salesman, was here this week in the interests of his house and also boosting Ben Selling's candidacy for United States Senator, yesterday received a telegram stating that his father, Louis Rau, of Portland, had suffered a stroke of apoplexy.

Gets New Auto—According to parties who returned from Portland on the Breakwater yesterday, Dr. Geo. E. Dix who is in Portland has purchased a new forty-horsepower Cadillac runabout and will bring it back with him. The machine was a special make and is said to be one of the classiest cars ever brought to the coast.

No Oil Yet—Tom Nicols has returned from a business trip to Bandon. He says that no oil has been struck in the Bear Creek oil well yet but that the indications are good. They have ordered casing to sink the well to a depth of 3000 feet. A meeting of the stockholders is to be held there Saturday evening to raise the additional funds for the work.

Not Insane—Paul J. Rasmussen, a Coos River rancher, was in Justice Pennock's court today to answer the charge of insanity preferred against him by Frank Turner. Two physicians who examined Rasmussen declared him to be sane. It is claimed that the charges were the outgrowth of trouble originating from the strife over the road to Coos River, near the Les Smith ranch.

Two Injured—R. E. Pinegor is carrying his hand in a sling today as a result of falling and dislocating his shoulder while indulging in a friendly scuffle with Albert Haines last evening. Ed Smith of Ivy Condron's grocery was also injured this morning while having a friendly scuffle with Claude Stutsman. More Delegates—The Marshfield Chamber of Commerce has added three to the delegation to assist in selecting the site of the Oregon building and of the Coos County building at the Panama-Pacific Exposition grounds at San Francisco, March 12. The last three added are E. E. Johnson of Coquille, Melville Dollar of the Dollar Steamship Company, and A. F. Estabrook of the Estabrook Steamship Company, which operates steamers between Bandon and San Francisco.

Dredge Moves—The dredge Oregon is being towed back to North Bend today and tomorrow will begin work on the channel at Virginia street and work north, pumping the dredgings in back of the bulkhead there. She finished the work at the Smith mill slip today. The new casting did not arrive yesterday but will reach here next Thursday according to a wire from Major Morrow. Until it arrives, Engineer Leeve will keep the dredge on the short pump.

Changes Case—Christian Hermann who several months ago instituted a case in the federal court at Portland containing rather sensational charges against Judge Hall, Henry Sengstacken, L. D. Smith and others has filed an amended petition. In the last petition he has made the lot owners in the Eastside property, which was formerly owned by Mrs. Norman, Hermann's first wife, joint defendants. The case will not come up for trial for some time.
