Improves Home—Hans Asplund on Elrod avenue has just had his home remodeled and renovated, the improvement including wiring and installing of a complete first class system of electric light fixtures by the Coos Bay Wiring Co.

Engage Hall—Jens Hansen and Tom Howard have made arrangements for the use of the former Redmen Hall on Front street as a meeting place for the recently organized Marshfield Development League. The next meeting of the league will probably be held next Friday night.

Supplies for Haines—Judging by the cargo of hay, flour, feed and supplies that the steamer Alliance was unloading at A. T. Haines' warehouse this morning, many thought that he was getting ready for the immediate coming of the railroad. Mr. Haines said this was only his usual consignment to take care of his rapidly increasing business.

Funeral Monday—The funeral of Oliver G. Landrith of Ten Mile who died yesterday at Mercy hospital will be held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Coos River cemetery where interment will be made. As Mr. Landrith was not a communicant of any church the services will probably be conducted by Judge Hall or some other friend.

Road Machinery—Judge John F. Hall returned today from Coquille, where he has been attending the regular session of the Coos County Commissioners. They ordered a large rock crusher which will be put in at the Coquille stone quarry. The old crusher will be taken to Bandon and the third put in on the upper Coquille. Make Spray — P. M. Hall-Lewis, fruit inspector for this district, returned last evening from a trip to Coquille valley points. He reports that the principal fruit growers in the valley have organized a company to manufacture lime-sulphur spray. He says they were forced to this because they could not get rates on spray in less than carload lots, making it almost prohibitive. The first plant will be built on the Coquille and later a smaller one will be put up on Coos Bay.

Trouble in School—There has been more or less trouble at the Bunker Hill school recently and it was made a special order of business at a meeting of the school board the night before last. Walter Richardson charged Principal Sherrill with whipping some of his children so severely that they had welts on their legs for many days. No definite action was taken. A meeting of the voters of the district has been called for March 18 and it is expected that the matter will be brought up again then.
