

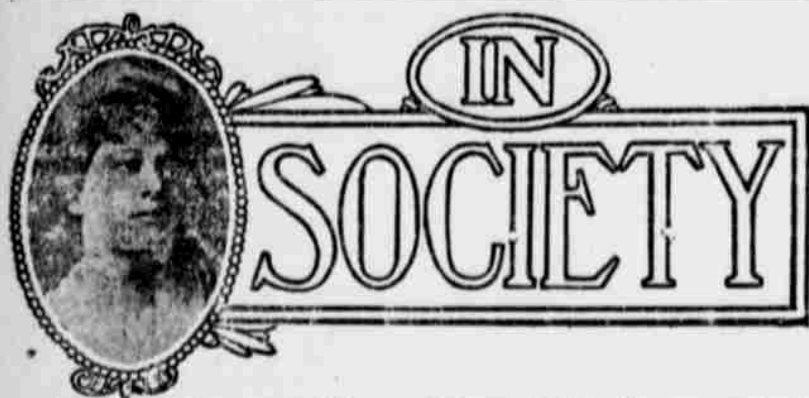

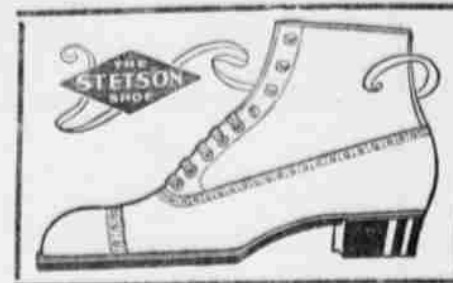

Alex. Anderson returned on the last Breakwater from a visit of two months in Portland.

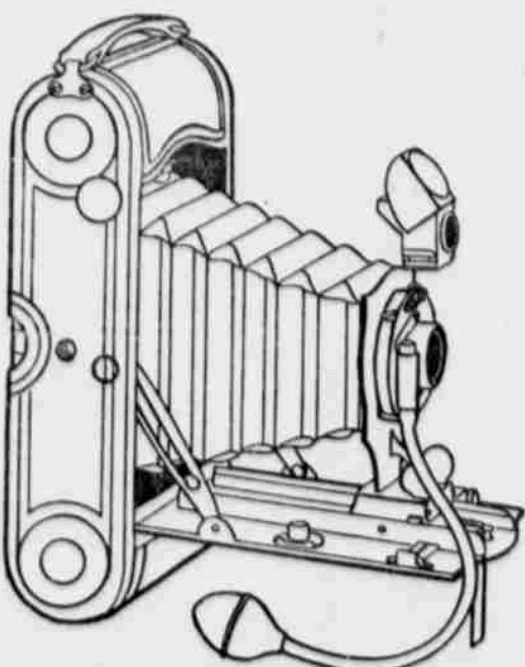
