OIL TANK STEAMER WRECKED ON CALIFORNIA COAST TODAY

Rosecrans, Belonging to Associated Oil Company, Goes on Rocks.

FEAR THREE LOST IN A SMALL BOAT

Vessel Carries Crew of Thirty-Six—Second Vessel Narrowly Escapes.

GAVIOTA, Calif., March 12.—The oil tank steamer Rosecrans of the Associated Oil Company went on the rocks near here early today in a severe storm. A small boat capsized while attempting to land through the surf and it is understood that three were drowned. The Rosecrans carried a crew of thirty-six. The vessel is in a serious position but it is believed that all the crew will get off. The fourmasted ship Falls of Clyde, also of the Associated Oil Company, was in grave danger for a while but it is believed that she will not be wrecked.

ELECT THREE OF COMMISSION

Terms of Port Commissioners Mingus, Sengstacken and Harris Expire.

The announcement that candidates for three places on the Port of Coos Bay Commission will be nominated at the regular primaries to be held April 19 is enlivening the local political field aside from the sudden display of activity in the game over state and county offices.

The terms of Dr. E. Mingus, Henry Sengstacken and Capt. W. C. Harris expire this year and their successors will be nominated in April and elected at the regular election.

It is understood that all three will be candidates for re-election, although none of them have definitely announced their candidacy.

So far as heard, the only opposition to any of them reported to date has come from J. W. Bennett. It is understood that Mr. Bennett wants Jas. H. Flanagan and A. H. Powers to enter the race. Whether they will remain to be determined.

BESSIE DOLLAR DUE IN FRIDAY

Big Lumber Carrier to Load Here Direct for China—Capt. Olson Pilot.

The Bessie Dollar, which will take out the largest cargo that was ever taken over the Coos Bay bar, will arrive here early Friday morning from San Francisco, according to advices received today. She will be piloted up the coast and into the bay by Capt. B. W. Olson of the Nann Smith, who remained over at San Francisco this trip for this purpose.

In a wire to Mrs. Olsen, Capt. Olson announced that the Bessie Dollar would sail from San Francisco Wednesday.

The Bessie Dollar will take on a cargo of 3,500,000 feet of dimension lumber at the Smith mill for China. This is a full cargo for her and she will sail direct, it is expected.

It is possible that Melville Dollar or another representative of the Dollar Steamship Company will accompany the vessel here.

Plans for loading the vessel having been made it is expected that a day and night shift will be worked. The Bessie Dollar sails under the British flag and her crew with the exception of the officers are Chinese.

DENY ALL DEMANDS OF MINERS

Operators of Anthracite Mines Will Not Make Concessions—Joint Meeting Tomorrow.

NEW YORK, March 12.—The subcommittee of the anthracite coal operators was prepared to meet again today to complete the draft of a reply refusing the demands of the hard coal workers. This reply, which will be given to the mineworkers tomorrow at the joint meeting of operators and miners' representatives, is expected to be so framed as to give the miners an opportunity to submit a new proposition. It is expected that all of the original demands of the miners will be denied.

ROOSEVELT IS LET OFF JURY

Former President Premptorily Challenged in New York Damage Case.

PASSES AWAY EARLY MONDAY

Patrick Rooney, Father of Mrs. John Yoakum, Succumbs Very Suddenly.

Patrick Rooney, father of Mrs. John Yoakum, died suddenly yesterday morning at his home near the Yoakum ranch on the Coquille-Marshfield road. Death was due to old age.

Mr. Rooney came to America in 1906, reaching Coos Bay October 26 of that year. He was born near the historic Tara Hill, County Meath, Ireland, in 1832, and spent the major portion of his life there. Tara Hill is about fifteen miles from Dublin.

He is survived by his wife and two children, Mrs. John Yoakum and John Rooney who reside in Ireland. Four grand children reside in Coos county. They are Miss Mary Ellen Rooney, who is taking a nurse's course at Mercy Hospital at North Bend, and Patrick J. Rooney, Joe Rooney and Bartholomew Rooney, who are employed by the Smith-Powers Logging Company. Mrs. Moriarty of South Marshfield is a sister of Mrs. Rooney.

The funeral will be held at 9:30 Wednesday morning from St. Monica's Catholic church, the Rev. Father J. A. Moran officiating.

SMELTER TRUST PROBE

House Wants to Know if it is Being Investigated.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—The House adopted today a resolution calling on the Department of Justice to make known whether the department was investigating any "smelter trust" in the United States, whether the American Smelting and Refining Company was connected with it, whether the prosecutions were begun or were in contemplation.

The resolution was a substitute from the Judiciary Committee for one introduced by Representative Martin, Democrat, of Colorado.

FIRST STRIKE STARTS.

Union Begins War on Non-Union Miners in Pennsylvania.

TAMAQUA, Penn., March 12.—Efforts to strengthen the union in the event of a possible strike caused a tie-up of the Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company's No. 9 mine and the Nesquehoning collieries here today, more than 2000 men and boys being idle. The trouble was caused by the refusal of a dozen to join the union.

The British mine owners and coal miners conferred for three and a half hours today, without reaching a settlement of the dispute.

TAFT TO HAVE CLEAN FIGHT

Insists that All Personal Attacks on Roosevelt Supporters Stop.

WASHINGTON, March 12.—After a conference today participated in by President Taft, Senator Crane, Director McKinley of the Taft Campaign Bureau and Secretary Hilles, it became known that hereafter the Literary Bureau will not indulge in personalities nor in attacks on Roosevelt or the men supporting him. Taft insisted, it was said, this method of attack be abandoned.

DELEGATES TO WASHINGTON

Mexican Revolutionists Plan to Make Appeal to President Taft.

CHIHUAHUA, March 12.—After the manner of Madero and his followers, Pasqual Orozco and the revolutionists he leads, are to have their representatives at Washington. Manuel Lujan and Juan Prieta Quemper, both well known local attorneys, left today for the American capital to place before President Taft the merits of the revolutionary cause. The commission was named by Orozco and his counselors with the belief that beligerency might be recognized.

REBELS LOSE BATTLE

Rumor That Mexican Federals Have Relieved Torreon.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 12.—Rumors that the Mexican federal troops had engaged the revolutionists in a battle near Torreon and had won a victory reached the State Department here today. The report came from Consul General Hanna at Monterrey who said he heard Torreon had been relieved.

Senator Culberson of Texas today arranged to discuss with Taft tomorrow the situation in Mexico and the need of more American troops on the border. Many telegrams from Chambers of Commerce in Texas asking for more troops have been received by the War Department.

GERMAN COAL STRIKE RIOTS

Several Officers and Many Strikers Injured in Clash Today.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

BERLIN, March 12.—Five policemen and many strikers were injured today in a riot near the Hamborn district of Dusseldorf in which 2000 striking coal miners attacked forty officers with revolvers and stones.

The police charged with drawn sabers.

Collisions between strikers, police and non-strikers occurred today in six or eight localities in the coal regions. The mine owners have telegraphed to the Minister of the Interior to send troops or to reinforce the police in the coal district. The police authorities assert that the police protection is sufficient.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12.—Dragging the Japanese proprietor, his wife and two children from their beds and binding them with ropes, three masked men looted the M. Zamans jewelry store early today. Gems valued at \$4000 are missing. While one of the bandits kept Mrs. Zaman and her two children covered with a revolver the other robbers compelled Zaman to open the safe. The family was then bound and the robbers left. Zaman released himself after struggling for an hour and notified the police.

Will Raise \$6,000,000 for Developing Company's Business Further.

PLAN TO OPEN YARDS ALONG ATLANTIC COAST

Expect to Ship Lumber Direct From Coos Bay in Own Vessels Through Canal.

The C. A. Smith Timber Company yesterday filed with County Clerk Watson at Coquille a mortgage for \$6,000,000 covering timber holdings in Coos, Curry, Lane, Linn and Douglas counties in Oregon and in El Dorado and Humboldt counties, California. The mortgage runs for twenty years and is to the Merchants' Trust Company of Chicago. The interest rate is at six per cent.

It is stated that \$4,500,000 of the principal has already been advanced and the balance will be in 1913.

HAVE BIG PLANS.

The filing of the big mortgage above referred to is understood to be for the purpose of raising funds for extending the business of the C. A. Smith Lumber Company.

It is understood that Mr. Smith is planning to have arrangements completed for invading the eastern lumber market just as soon as the Panama canal is opened. The plan is said to include the opening of yards at Boston, New York and other Atlantic shipping centers. These will be supplied by the company's own ships carrying lumber direct from Coos Bay through the Panama canal.

The new vessel, which the company is now arranging to have built, will be the first of this fleet of lumber carriers it is understood.
