BIG DEAL ON FOR PROPERTY

Syndicate Reported to Be Buying 1500 Acres From Simpson Company.

According to a report reaching here from San Francisco, negotiations are ending for the purchase of about 1500 acres of land on South Inlet by a syndicate from the Simpson Lumber Company. It is said that the deal involves about \$250,000. Very few particulars are obtainable other than that the purchasers merely want the land and waterfront, the timber and other features of the property going to the Simpson Lumber Company.
No confirmation of the report could be obtained on the Bay today, although it came from a reliable source in San Francisco. Captain Edgar Simpson when called up about the report said that there was nothing to the deal yet, anyway.

Buys Interest—W. H. Ashman, who has been clerking in Al Owens' cigar stand, has purchased Ed Richmond's interest in the Blanco billiard parlors, closing the deal yesterday. He and Jack Davis will conduct the business now and endeavor to make it even a more popular amusement resort than it has been in the past. Mr. Richmond and his family will leave soon for The Dalles.

Gets Verdict—According to word from Portland, a jury in the federal court there awarded Thomas Thorwald a verdict for \$1500 damages against the C. A. Smith Lumber Company. Thorwald was suing for \$20,000 damages for personal injuries which he alleged to have sustained here. John D. Goss who represented the company in the trial is expected to return from Portland Thursday.

More Houses Here—As a result of the report on the number of residence and business houses in the Marshfield free mail delivery district being given as an average for each carrier, instead of a total for the district, it was erroneously interpreted in the Times yesterday. In Carrier Sneedon's district there are 53 business houses and 392 residences, while in Carrier Haas' district there are 150 business houses and 366 residences.

Captures Horse Thief—Sheriff Dan Kerfoot of Malheur county, Oregon, passed through here today en route home to Vail with a horse thief named Culp, who is under indictment there. He has been in search of Culp for a year and finally Sheriff Redmond of Eureka picked him up. Culp is about fifty years old and is declared to have been operating with a gang in Central Oregon. Sheriff Kerfoot reports that a force of men are working on the new east and west Harriman line near Vail and all there are hoping for its early completion to Coos Bay.

BAD MIXUP IN ACCOUNT CASE

Efforts of Couple to Escape Notoriety of Court Prove Futile Today.

Justice Pennock's court was the scene of a peculiar mixup today. E. H. Joehnk had started suit for Henry Holm to collect \$38 from John and Maggie Wall on an account. They claimed that they did not owe the money, Holm having bought stock from them to more than that amount and failed to give them credit. Rather than to fight the matter they offered to settle for \$30. This was accepted.

Then Wm. Ross, captain of the launch Banshee, came along and wanted to get the money that Walls were to pay in as part settlement of a claim of \$55 he held against Henry Holm. He was referred to a lawyer and Mr. and Mrs. Wall paid in the \$30 to Justice Pennock as trustee.

Pretty quick Ross and J. C. Kendall returned and the latter began attachment proceedings. Justice Pennock deciding that the money had been turned over to him personally instead of the court and returning it to Mr. and Mrs. Wall. The attachment proceedings necessitated the Walls paying the money over to Constable Cox and now Joehnk is going to recover it for Holm.

The matter is badly mixed up and will necessitate Mr. and Mrs. Wall entering court as witnesses at least, although they tried hard to escape the notoriety of it.
