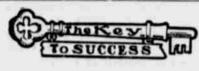
President Gray of Hill Oregon Lines Interested in Roseburg Project.

Of extraordinary interest and importance within itself, but foreshadowing a far greater project, is the authoritative announcement that a five-story hotel, costing \$100,000, is to rise in Roseburg this year. Directly behind the hotel venture are men who are also heads of the Hill railway lines in the Pacific northwest, and this gives a logical base to the belief that Roseburg's longcherished hope of another railway line is at last in a fair way to be realized.
