ANTI-VICE CRUSADE

Marshal Carter After Undesirables—One Forfeits \$50 Bail

Marshal Carter has issued an anti-vice crusade, directing it especially against the parasites that have been increasing rapidly in number here recently. The first step in it was taken yesterday when he arrested Fred Beard for habituating with the undesirables. Beard furnished \$50 cash bail but this morning failed to show up in City Recorder Butler's court for hearing and the bail was declared forfeited. Beard has not been seen since his release and is presumed to have left town. He arrived here but a short time ago from Eureka. Marshal Carter is getting evidence against several others and they will be treated similarly within a few days.

LANE WILL RUN

PORTLAND, Ore., March 14.—Dr. Harry Lane, ex-Mayor of Portland, today announced his decision to become a democratic candidate for United States senator. The decision came after a previous announcement that he would not enter the contest. His change of mind, he says, is due to repeated demands from his democratic friends. His entry makes three in the race on the democratic side. The other two are Walter Pierce and Milton A. Miller.

INCOME TAX BILL IS UP

Chairman Underwood Reports in Favor of Passage of Excise Measure.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 14.—Maintaining the constitutionality of the proposed excise tax bill, extending the provisions of the corporation tax law to individuals and partnerships, submitted as a revenue measure to replace customs duties on sugar, Representative Underwood, Chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, made a report to the House today urging the passage of the bill. The report declares that the proposed tax bill is in absolute conformity with the supreme court decisions relating to the income tax. The report calls proposed bill a combination of the excise tax of 1898 and the corporation tax law of 1909, both of which have been held to be valid in all respects by the supreme court. Continuing the report, he asserts that the burden of "our present indirect taxation" falls upon the people having incomes of less than \$2,000. To illustrate the equitable adjustment of the excise law it is recommended that persons with incomes of less than \$5,000 per annum would pay nothing while a person whose business earns \$10,000 net would pay no tax on the first \$5,000 and on the second would pay only \$50 a year. The report calls attention to the income tax law of 1894 and argues it would have been sustained if drawn in the form of the law now proposed.
